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




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

The Hearing Procedures in a Labor Dispute Arbitration

o make awards of labor dispute cases, labor dispute arbitration commissions shall adopt the arbitral tribunal system. The arbitral tribunal shall be composed of three arbitrators, with one serving as chief arbitrator. And the cases may be solely arbitrated by one arbitrator if the they are

The labor dispute arbitration commission shall, within five days from the date it accepts an application for arbitration, make a notification to the parties concerning to the composition of the arbitral tribunal in written to the parties.

An arbitrator shall withdraw, and the parties is entitled to apply for his withdrawal orally or in written, under one of the circumstances sent out following:

- (i) He/She is a party to the case in question or a close relative of a party or its agents;
- (ii) He has interest relations to the case;;
- (iii) He has other relations with a party to the case or its agent, which may affect impartial award:
- (iv) He meets with a party or its agent without authorization or accepts invitation to dinner or gifts

The labor dispute arbitration commission shall, in a timely manner, make a decision on the application for withdrawal and notify the parties of the decision orally or in written.

The arbitral tribunal shall notify both parties to the date and place of the hearing five days before the hearing is held. A party who has justifiable reasons may request for postponing the hearing three days before the hearing is held. The labor dispute arbitration shall decide whether the request is approved

In the course of arbitration, the parties is entitled to examine and cross examine and debate. When the examination and cross examination and debating is ended, the arbitrator shall solicit the final opinions to the parties

Where the evidence provided by a party is substantiated upon verification, the arbitral tribunal shall confirm the facts on ground of such evidence.

Where a worker fails to provide the evidence which is kept and controlled by the employing unit and is relevant to his arbitration claim, the arbitral tribunal may require the employing unit to provide such evidence within a specified time limit. Where the employing unit fails to do so, it shall bear the

The arbitral tribunal shall make a written record of the hearing. Where the parties or the other participants in the arbitration believe that there are omissions or errors in their recorded statements they shall have the right to apply for supplementation or correction. If the tribunal refuses to do so, the application shall be recorded.

The written record shall be signed or sealed by the arbitrators, recording clerks, the parties and other participants in the arbitration.

After applying for arbitration of their labor dispute, the party may reach a settlement on their own. Where a settlement agreement is reached, the arbitration application may be withdrawn.

The arbitral tribunal shall mediate before making an award. When an agreement is reached through mediation, a statement of mediation shall be prepared by the arbitral tribunal.

Where mediation fails to or before the statement of mediation is served, one party goes back on the agreement reached, the arbitral tribunal shall make an award in a timely manner.

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

Xi Jinping was sworn in as general secretary of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of China (CPC), leading the seven-seat Political Bureau Standing

The other six members of the top leadership of the Party's central leading organ are Li Keqiang, Zhang Dejiang, Yu Zhengsheng, Liu Yunshan, Wang Qishan and Zhang Gaoli.

They were elected at the first plenum of the 18th CPC Central Committee following the CPC's 18th National Congress. Their election marked a smooth top leadership transition following the 16th national congresses of the Party in 2002.

A wildlife photographer triggered the alarm on November 11 after he found in Beidagang Wetland Reserve that some oriental white storks were unwell.

There are less than 2,500 of the critically endangered species in the world, and 500 of them are living in the wetland reserve south of downtown Tianjin.

Volunteers from the Tianjin Bird Watching Society, Dagang Oil Field Bicycle Club and Wildlife Conservation Society rushed to rescue the poisoned birds.

Carbofuran, one of the most toxic pesticide, has been discovered at three spots to be illegally used to intentionally poison

15 poisoned oriental white storks have been sent to hospital while two are in critical conditions.

Air China launches Tianjin-Chongqing-Lijiang

According to the statistics, the passenger flow hit 3 million after the Line 3 opened for a month. The passenger flow hit 10.5 million after Line 1, 2 and 3 operated in networks.

Besides Line 5 and 6, the construction works for Line 1 eastern line, Line 2 airport line, and Line 3 south station line have been started. By 2020, Tianiin rail transit will stretch to 1,000km. covering both its urban and rural areas.

In addition, the mobile phone signal will cover the Tianjin subway in the near future.

iven the fact that Tianjin's many fine hotels are vying for customers in an ever increasingly choosy market, what is the secret to keeping the paying customers happy, and at the same time satisfying the requirements of the investors, a notoriously difficult feat? At the Tangla Tianjin they have discovered the secret – finding a niche in the market and filling it. Let's now meet one of the men behind this particular brand.

Fintan O'Doherty, the General Manager



of the Tangla Hotel has impressive credentials. His hotel experience reads like a who's who of the stars of the hotel world, the Hilton, The Copthorne Tara, Radisson Edwardian, etc. and he has worked in such diverse places as Kiev, Ho Chi Minh City, Singapore, London etc. etc., the list goes on. I wondered if after having being in such exciting places, the move to Tianjin seems like somewhat of a downgrade. He was quick to assure me that this was not the case, he said "There is lots to do in the hotel and in the city. I think that China is very exciting, there are a lot of differences with back home, but there are also a lot of similarities". He lived in London for many years and I agree with him, there are similarities with Tianjin. I wondered if his life was as exciting as it sounds and he smiled and said "I get to travel a lot and I can pack a lot into one day".

Of course any good Manager delegates and he said "I have a good team and it is important to dignify them by delegating and giving them responsibility". I put forward a view that some people feel that the service in North China is not as good as it is in the South, but he answered "This is the first time I have heard that. You can train people, if you train them well they will be able to offer a high standard of service whatever their location."

He came to Tianjin in a roundabout way, due to unforeseen circumstances his original previous plan to work in Beijing changed and he was asked to go and work at the Hilton in

Chong Qing. All he knew was that Chong Qing is a city in China, nothing else, so he had to quickly research exactly where and what kind of place it is. He found working in China very enjoyable and did sterling work at the hotel, but nevertheless exciting pastures beckoned in the form of the Meritus Mandarin in Singapore. He told me Singapore is a fascinating place, however despite its sophistication and reputation for cleanliness he did not feel that it was 'better' than China. After that an opportunity came up to work in Ho Chi Minh City at the Windsor Plaza. He loved the vibrancy of this city and in a way was sad to leave. However the lure of Beijing was attracting him, so when a former Hilton colleague asked him to go to Beijing to manage a new flagship hotel, the Tangla, he leapt at the chance. As is the way with the hotel business, there are myriad opportunities to further one's career so he also didn't hesitate when the chance to take over the Tangla Tianjin arose.

The Tangla hotels are owned by HNA Airlines and they plan to have 50 Hotels within five years. This is not the extent of their ambitious ideas, regarding future development he told me "The Tangla brand is part of a company that owns many brands, including Hainan Airlines. Our plans for the future include the aim to have a Tangla hotel in every city that the airline flies to. Plans are also underway to have a Tangla in New York. In January next year we will be opening a 420 room Tangla resort hotel in Sanya".

Back to the Hotel itself. Chinese customers like to spend money but they also like to see what they are getting for it, consequently many Chinese owned hotels are ostentatious and are over the top in terms of décor. I asked him what is different about the Tangla. He explained that the Tangla brand is a Chinese owned hotel group, it has to appeal to Chinese customers, who let's face it are the majority, but it also combines the business acumen of the west. This successful marrying of the two ideals has resulted in a remarkable hotel.

Western thinking is that less is more and something doesn't have to look flashy to prove it is expensive. Although class is not something that can be bought, there has obviously been a lot of money spent on this hotel. Whilst the elegance is understated, it is

clear that this is a very sophisticated establishment. The Tangla is special for many reasons. Even its name is connected with a legend set in the Tanggula mountain area and reflects the wishes and fortune of the Guardian God. The Tangla Hotels & Resorts' brand core values are "Harmony, Elegance, Excellence and Tranquility". I can confirm that they are indeed living up to these values through this particular hotel. Although located at Binjiang Dao, all the rooms are penthouse rooms, so they are far above the hustle and bustle of what must be Tianjin's busiest area, people and traffic wise. Everywhere in the hotel an atmosphere of peace reigns, even the elevators are so discreetly disguised, that it is not immediately apparent where they are. If I sound like a starstruck fan, it is because I am. This hotel screams, albeit quietly, of class.

The harmony and tranquillity themes are carried through to the spa and swimming pool areas, there are candles and the scent of beautiful essential oils everywhere. Excellence is a given, we were fortunate enough to be invited to lunch and the food and presentation is of the highest quality. I spoke with the head chef, who had come from Beijing and he was knowledgeable and enthusiastic.

I was delighted when Mr. O'Doherty offered to show us the rooms, including the presidential suite. Being a person of modest means I can guarantee I probably will never stay in a presidential suite in my life, but I like to live vicariously through others, so this chance to see how the moneyed and famous pass time in hotels was a unique opportunity for me. Fabulous does not do it justice, but however, the other rooms are just as impressive in their own way. I asked to see an "ordinary" room. Actually there is no such thing, as although they are classed as "ordinary" they are actually twice the size of normal hotel rooms, and one can enjoy a relaxing bath whilst gazing out over the skyline. As I said, the rooms are so high up nobody is overlooking you so there is no need for curtains.

To the question where will you be in five years' time he answered "I will definitely still be in China". I get the feeling that he will not rest until the Tangla brand is the number one choice for discerning hotel guests. Yesterday Beijing, today Tianjin – tomorrow the world!



To Divorce or Not? A Painful Decision

ust recently I read a salutary tale of a husband and wife, both lawyers, who went through such a messy divorce and resulting custody battle for their three children, that their £3.2 million pound house had to be sold to fund the legal costs and all they were left with was £90,000 between them. The house that represented their life's work disappeared into the black hole that was their lawyer's pockets. The Judge in the trial criticised the couple for hating each other so much that they rushed headlong into mutual financial destruction. He said that they had effectively destroyed the ship of marriage and then wrecked the lifeboats too. The wife said she did it to stop her husband getting custody of the children, and blamed their lawyers for encouraging them to go to litigation. The

question was asked how a couple who once loved each other enough to get married and have three children together, could end up in such a hate filled situation.

Whilst no-one can sit in judgement on somebody's else's marriage, it is a sad truth that often it is the lawyers who benefit from divorce the most, so it is in their interests to urge their clients to go down this route, rather than encourage them to try to salvage their marriage, divorce means income for the lawyers.

In England it is relatively easy to get a divorce, the husband or wife can just cite unreasonable behaviour or irreconcilable differences. I have never understood what unreasonable behaviour means, after all what I think is unreasonable is not what you may

think is unreasonable and vice versa. In America it is even easier to get divorced and the internet has lots of advice as to the easiest ways.

Once upon a time in China a failed marriage was a thing of shame, usually the blame was laid squarely at the door of the woman. Even if the husband had a mistress it was deemed that he, because of his wife's inadequacies, had no choice but to turn to another woman. Times change however and in modern China divorce is not frowned on so much. Indeed the numbers of divorced people are growing amongst both the younger and older generation. Pressure to marry surely must be a factor, as many marry those whom they do not love. Usually when I ask my friends about changing attitudes in China, if it is something that is perceived as bad they always say "Oh it is because we see it on western TV programmes, so we copy". Still I wanted to know how Chinese people really feel about divorce so I interviewed four people and essentially asked 9 questions, namely:-

- How do you feel about divorce?
- 2. Do you have any divorced friends, if so what is their situation?
- 3. Before in China divorce was rare but now there are more and more people

getting divorced, why do you think there has been a change?

- 4. In the west in most cases it is relatively simple to get divorced, is it that easy to get divorced here?
- 5.If a couple decide to get divorced do you think friends ought to offer advice? (Remember many Chinese people listen to what their friends have to say).
- 6. If your friends want to divorce what advice would you give them?
- 7. Do you think some people decide too quickly to divorce?
- 8. After divorce whose life do you think will be easier, the man or the woman's?
 9. In the west divorce is not shameful for parents or their children. Do the children of divorced parents here experience any prejudice?

View of Chinese Women

Li Li who has been married for three years said that she feels divorce is quite normal and not at all surprising. She has friends that are divorced, some of them are enjoying being single, the others, after a period of letting the dust of divorce settle, look around for someone new. She does agree that although there were far fewer divorced people in China before, now there are more and more couples deciding to get divorced. She said "I feel that there has been a change because of several things.

- 1. Before Chinese society became more open, people would absolutely not tolerate couples living together before marriage, or even pre-marital sex, but now most people accept these things. The old idea of being faithful unto death hardly exists anymore. People can accept divorce and remarriage.
- 2. People today have many more pressures than people in the past had. Rising prices, the need to buy a house, school fees for the children, meeting the medical expenses of elderly family members, the problem of trying to keep up with the neighbours, it all makes a person feel as if there is such heavy pressure on them that they cannot breathe. It is difficult

to find the balance that makes for a happy family life. People have started to look outside their marriages for happiness.

3. These days there are many more ways to communicate with people and this unfortunately has brought negative influences. QQ and Weibo amongst others have closed the distances between people, consequently sometimes they are enticed by others. Marriages are under threat from all the things I have mentioned.

It is not as easy in China to get divorced as it is in the west, especially if there are children involved. There is the problem of dividing up the assets in a family, deciding what happens to the children and who will bring them up, friends and family will oppose a divorce so there is their view to be considered. If somebody asked my advice as to whether or not they should divorce. I would give them my opinion, but at the end of the day the people involved have to decide whether to stay in the marriage or to walk away from it. I would give them advice such as to think carefully about it, and tell them to ask themselves what caused them to want to get divorced in the first place. Maybe they need to think about the fundamental issues they have and really make sure that their situation truly is irredeemable before deciding to divorce. They should not make such a drastic decision because they are temporarily angry. If they have children, I would ask them if they had already agreed on how to raise the child. Divorce should be done in such a way so as to result in the least harm to the child Before making a final decision both sides should be given time and space to think about it very carefully.

Many people decide to get divorced too quickly, there are no "good reasons" to get divorced, but many people decide to do it because their love has died. Also of course some people have extramarital affairs that lead to a marriage being broken up. If a couple decide to get divorced I don't think the man necessarily finds it easier to adapt than a woman, but if there are children involved, naturally this will complicate matters, especially in a financial sense. I know that in the west if a couple get divorced it is viewed as nothing and their children will not suffer prejudice. Chinese society is much more tolerant now so divorce in itself may not carry so much stigma, however some traditional views are still held so there are bound to be some people whose thinking and attitudes will have an influence on the child".

Li Li's opinion is very balanced and she does have good advice to give to her friends. She has also mentioned the downside of internet communication, this is a familiar story, someone falls in love with someone who they are communicating with via the internet and suddenly want to leave their families for their new 'love'. Sometimes before they have even met in person they are willing to give up everything for the new relationship. In China they use QQ to chat with friends and also to network with strangers.

Yu Yu, who has been married 5 years, told me "I feel that women should not agree to divorce, they will be lonely, pitiful and helpless, after all this world is still dominated by men. I do have friends that are divorced, outwardly they seem to be doing ok, but I think that the reality is that looks are deceiving and maybe they are not doing as well as people assume. I think one of the problems is that many girls are the only child of the family and the divorce rate amongst them is particularly high. I feel that these women are especially helpless. I imagine there are several reasons why the divorce rate is increasing:-

- 1. Many people have attitude problems, they think the grass always looks greener on the other side.
- 2. Different habits, for instance some girls that are the only child have a high opinion of themselves, this is because their family members treat like them like princesses. We all make mistakes, but they are not taught this, so when they get married and experience difficulties they will not admit any fault on their part. They have their own rules of behaviour.
- 3. Parents are also part of the problem, they think that their child will suffer when they get married and they are blind to the faults of their own child. They interfere in the marriage, also blaming the other party, problems are never the fault of their child.
- 4. Years ago when people got married they shared everything, money and other assets became the property of both of them. In my father's time a couple would strive together to go in the same direction to make the marriage work, but these days couples still

have their own separate property, separate money. There is a very clear distinction about what belongs to who. The attitude seems to be what's mine is mine and what's yours is yours.

5. There is also media interference, nowadays there are many programmes offering advice to married couples, sometimes it is bad advice but people still follow it as it is deemed to be given by "experts".

For a lot of people children are not their first priority, they are more concerned with dividing up the family assets. If they can do that smoothly then the divorce proceedings are relatively straight-forward, probably the methods here are in line with the rest of the world.

I don't think friends necessarily need to get involved, the problem should for the couple to handle. Most people will stand on the side of their own friend and will take their standpoint on issues. I would tell my friends that they should listen to their own heart, if they want to get divorced then get divorced, if they don't want to get divorced then don't. I think unless there is someone else involved, or they cannot have children, any other reason for getting divorced is not really a good reason.

Of course divorced men have it easier than women. I know divorced men who very quickly found new partners who were women that had never been married. These days there is definitely something wrong with people's values, as long as the man has money, status and position, the women will not care about anything else.

I think today's children will quickly become used to the "fast food" style of

marriage. Some divorced parents get along together very well. Maybe when children are small they suffer more, but as they get older they realise that if their parents are really not happy, they will come to the conclusion themselves that it is better for the parents to separate".

The Perils of Modern Living

One lady told me that her husband had met another woman via OO and wanted a divorce. His behaviour to her was almost intolerable as she would not agree to divorce him, so he did everything in his power to make her hate him. He has repeatedly told her that he does not love her. Unfortunately for her she still loves him. We may think that she should just let go of him, and that once somebody does not want to stay with you, you cannot force them. However the complication is that she has a 7 year old son, and so feels that if she agrees to the divorce his future would be adversely affected. She has begged him to think about his actions and how they affect their child, but he is adamant that he wants to leave and live with his girlfriend, he has told her she can keep the child as his girlfriend is not interested in looking after someone else's child.

The reason he has not just upped and left is that in China women have a lot of protection from the law. If he just leaves, the divorce court would look unfavourably upon it and probably the wife would get to keep the house for the sake of the child. He is willing to forsake his child, but not his house, so for the time being they are still living together. Of course I have only heard her side of the story



and no doubt the husband has a totally different view of their life together, however it is a fact that they do have a young child and it is that fact that should influence their decisions.

Another lady told me that she had surreptitiously checked her husband's messages and found that he was communicating with a young woman via QQ. She did not waste any time and told him she wanted a divorce. He got such a fright that he ceased to use his QQ account immediately. For him the prospect of divorce was too frightening to contemplate. They too have a young child that he dotes on so fortunately this marriage was saved.

The View of Chinese Men

The above opinions belonged to women so I also interviewed a couple of men. Zhou who has been married for one year said "20 years ago divorce was viewed as very shameful. Now however if people decide that they don't love each other anymore, they can just get divorced. We all have freedom these days, everyone has the right to decide for themselves. I do know people that are divorced but their circumstances depend upon whether they live in the city or the countryside. I can give you two examples. My wife has a friend who got married to a local ruffian. They were married for 7 years and then they had a child. The man did not work and just did all kinds of things to get money, he also beat his wife all the time but because she loved him she put up with him. She then developed a serious problem. Although she had her own work and was quite busy, she would often help people such as sweeping snow away from neighbour's doors, however she could never remember doing so. Her boss took her to the hospital to get checked out and they discovered that she was schizophrenic. Her family thought up a good reason for her to return to her hometown in the country in order to rest. Her husband eventually decided to divorce her, but because in the countryside men outnumber women, despite her problems, many men came to her door asking to marry her. If she was in the city, she would not have so many opportunities to remarry

The other people I know that are divorced come from the city. This couple both went to Japan to study and became very good friends. Because they found it difficult and struggled in Japan, they became very close and fell in love. After six years of being together the man decided to return to China to work and develop a business, whilst the woman stayed in Japan developing her business. However they continued to be a couple. After 11 years the woman came back

to Tianjin and they got married. After six months of marriage they decided they were not suited and the wife flew back to Japan. So after 11 years of being a couple, it took just six months of marriage to destroy their relationship and they got divorced.

Before in China there was not much movement of people, they tended to stay in the same place all their lives. This mean that they would be very familiar with each other so if a couple got divorced it would be talked about by everybody, especially by the husband and wife's older sisters. Also values back then were a lot more restrictive. Today people have

the opportunity to travel more and live in other places, this means there will be opportunities to meet other people.

There are many people that get divorced quick as a flash, especially young people, but it is quite complicated if there are things to consider such as property, children, family business and other assets, all these things have to be taken into consideration and most of the time only the Courts can decide what to do. I don't think it is that easy to get divorced abroad either.

Although it is not that simple to get involved in someone else's household matters, friends should mediate and advise them not to divorce, people should definitely think twice before deciding to go down this route, because if they decide after that they have made a mistake and want to get back together again, it will never be the same, just like if a mirror is broken and people try to fix it, it would always have cracks. Chinese people think that if everything in the family and home is going well, naturally everything else in life will be ok. However if there really is no way for a couple to get along then there is no choice but to divorce. I don't really know what kind of reasons are not good reasons to divorce. Regarding life being easier for one party than the other, my feelings are that life is not easy anyway. I think we have to look after each other and encourage each other, if people get divorced and don't marry again, life will definitely be harder. At the moment in the media, some reports are saying that at least in the city 2nd hand men are very popular, they are bestsellers! If a divorced woman has no children she should be able to find another

As family is so important to Chinese people, the family home should be a sanctuary for children. If their parents get divorced then the love that they experience is halved, it is not complete so I think it would bring about an extreme change in their personality".

Zhang who has been married for four years says "The word 'divorce' is never far from my wife's mouth. Every time we argue her response is that we should get divorced. However I think we are far from divorce, it will not happen. At the moment I don't have any friends that are divorced, but many of them have a bad relationship with their wives and they always call me up and invite me out just so they can grumble about them.

I think there has been a change in Chinese thinking regarding divorce, however China is still very traditional and divorce is not thought to be a good solution. If a couple want to divorce there really is a lot for them to consider, for instance will their parents accept it? If they have children what kind of influence will it have on them? To put it simply, in the past Chinese people lived for other people, not for themselves, so they had to consider what everybody else wanted. Nowadays people have moved on from that way of life and they live more for themselves, so if a couple are not suited they can divorce. It is not a simple thing to get divorced in China because of the problems of sorting out the family assets and how to bring up the children. As far as giving advice is concerned, if the person giving the advice knows the couple well and they ask for advice, that is ok. If a friend of mine asked me for advice I would help him to analyse the problem deeply to see whether or not there is another way to handle the problem other than divorce. If he has thoroughly explored every other avenue but still wanted to get divorced then I wouldn't oppose him, after all everyone has the right to decide for themselves.

Many people get divorced because they don't love each other anymore, but I don't agree with this. I think that marriage is sacred, so if people get divorced for this reason both sides are not facing up to their responsibilities. When two people get divorced maybe it is the man who has it easier but I am not too sure.

In China bringing up children in single parent families will definitely present problems, I think the children will have issues in their hearts and minds. They will lose the feeling of both parents loving and taking care of them together. They will also suffer discrimination and they will lose their own identity and not know their place in society".



Not The Only Solution

Well there you have it, I have spoken to many Chinese people about divorce and the responses presented here really do reflect an accurate view of how Chinese people view divorce at the moment. The statistics are rising ever higher as already mentioned, which is worrying many people, as the family has always been at the very heart of Chinese society. As the family arrangement is breaking down, many people feel that the very fabric of society is being threatened.

Insidious TV and radio programmes that give the harmful advice to please oneself and get out of a marriage on a whim do nothing to help society. Of course it is easy for me to talk, but for a couple whose marriage is in



crisis, surely the last thing they need is to consult complete strangers on air, whose sole motive is to increase the viewing or listening figures, as to the best way to resolve their problems. I admit I used to be one of those people who watched these shows and I acted as an armchair judge, jury and mediator. I feel very foolish when I think about my responses, shouting at the TV urging the wife to leave her "no good husband". Thank goodness I saw sense and banished those harmful manipulative programmes from my life.

Communication is essential to maintaining a good marriage, and doing this through the media is not a good way. A marriage in trouble can be saved if both parties are willing to work at it. Chinese parents who object to their children divorcing do so for good reasons, but sometimes it can have negative results. Sometimes the parents are just worried about what the neighbours think. Providing there are no big reasons for the cause of trouble in the marriage, like wife /husband beating, alcoholism/drug/gambling problems or a third party, sometimes a marriage can be saved. Some advice suggested that such couples take the time to sit down and work out what went wrong, and if they felt they didn't love each other anymore, to ask themselves at which point this started to happen. They could also try to fall in love with each again by reminding themselves of why they got together in the first place. No-one ever said marriage was easy and a husband who has been married for a very long time said "A good marriage is a union of two good forgivers".

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Ding Dong Merrily on High!!

hallmark of British presence in different places used to be the local church building, most notably those of the Anglican Church or Church of England. From Tianjin to Cape Town to Nova Scotia, these can be found. All Saints' is an example in this city. It housed a large tenor bell that would ring out calling people to the Sunday services and tolling on the occasion of weddings and special celebrations like Christmas.

Anglicans in Tientsin had started out meeting for a weekly English service of worship and preaching with other Protestants in the Union Church which had been built on the Daku Road in 1864. Growing numbers of led to Anglicans requesting a place for their own meetings. The Bishop of North China, Rev Charles Perry Scott who had first come to China in 1874 sent by the Church Missionary Society (CMS), became bishop in 1880 and took up their cause. He requested a clergyman. In 1890, a church was dedicated and

Reverend Brereton instituted to minister to a congregation of about 40. In appreciation of his services, the British Municipal Council offered a site for a church and parsonage. Church wardens were appointed. Reverend Francis Lushington (Frank) Norris followed. Bishop Scott frequently visited and observed that Tientsin's foreign population was increasing very rapidly, promising to make it a very large place should North China continue to open to commerce. He took up the idea of building a more substantial church building to replace the little church room that was being used by Anglicans in the town, "...at Christmas time the little church room was fairly overcrowded...", he commented in a letter back to England for publication in the North China Mission Ouarterly (April 1899). Meanwhile, Rev Norris had mentioned the need for a bell to acquaintance, Reverend Oswald Pryor Wardell-Yerburgh who was then Rector of Christ Church, South Marylebone. He had previously given some fifty hand bells to the church school

for boys in Peking. Interestingly, all these were lost in 1900 when mission property was burned and looted but they were subsequently found being sold off in a street! One was then used in St Hilary's Chapel, Peking. Rev. Norris raised some £54 towards the cost of shipping a bell. The remaining £10 was received from donations made in England having appealed to bell ringers and others through a letter in the North China Missions Quarterly. By the late 1890s, the bell had arrived in Tientsin

The bell came from the foundry of Messrs Mears and Stainbank, Whitechapel in the East End of London. The foundry produced a number of famous London church bells as well as many across the world, including America's original Liberty Bell (1752) used to proclaim American Independence and that which famously rings out from Big Ben (1858) in Westminster. It also designed the 2012 Olympic Bell. The bell had engraved upon it the names of Bishop Scott and

Rev Norris as well as the apt refrain from the psalms:

"Let all the people's praise Thee."


However, as there was as yet no church building, the bell was used in the CMS compound. Bishop Scott and Rev. Norris pressed on with the challenge of fund-raising with subscriptions and donations gradually accumulated in the Tientsin Church of England Fund. The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel (SPG) made a sizeable grant of £500 from the Marriott Bequest (The Mission Field , Nov. 1903). Plans were drawn up and the decision was made to build in phases as monies allowed. This in fact actually increased the total cost of the building to some £3000.

The foundation was duly laid on 4 June 1900 by the bishop's young wife, Mrs Scott, but subsequent events with the Boxer Siege of Tientsin brought the work to a standstill and it was only finally completed in 1903.

300 people. The substantial grev brick was topped with reddish Marseilles tiles and the red and black floor tiles were imported from England. The substantial pews were placed on flooring planks stained dark walnut to provide warmth, as did American heating furnaces placed below the central portion of the floor, Light came through leaded window panes and some stained glass windows. There were tapestries hung and a small American organ. Acoustic properties were very good. The bell could finally be put to the use for which it had long been envisaged! Though the whereabouts of the Tientsin bell are now unknown, the steeple in which it once hung remains, testimony to a group of expatriates who once lived here.


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How much is too much

Online gaming in China, like everything else Chinese, represents a huge market. The industry does well over 15 billion USD per year and is only on the rise. A large part of the online gaming industry outside of China is generated through consoles like the Xbox 360 and PlayStation, which offer subscription based online gaming communities that allow players to connect worldwide. However, both of these major consoles are banned here in China. And while there may be ways to get through the gaps in the great firewall, the lion share of gaming revenue in the Middle Kingdom comes from PC based MMORPG's

(Massively Multiplayer Online Role-Playing Game). For those of you with a tangible social life, these games are like most role playing video games in that players take on the identity of a character in a game and control his actions. These games are often set in a fantasy world. The other characteristic of MMORPG's is that they exist in a digital world hosted by the game's publisher. These games occur in a persistent, digital world that continues to evolve even when a player is not logged in to the game. Many games, like World of Warcraft, allow for social interaction between characters and allow strangers from across the globe to interact in a digital space. While this may be a new form of communication it also represents huge business for game publishers.

According to John Gaudiosi of Forbes.com, "China is home to more than 150 million gamers who collectively generate half of the global PC online games revenue, and several large online game companies that have begun to expand internationally," said Lisa Cosmas Hanson, managing partner of Niko Partners. "Our analysis shows that while Chinese gamers start with casual and social games, many evolve into MMOG gamers and then contribute much more revenue than gamers who stick to simpler games."



Subscriptions to these kinds of games are generating most revenue for video game publishers, however, some companies have experimented with in-game advertisements but gamer reaction has been quite hostile. The point of immersing oneself in an online game is escape, and if you see a Nike ad in the middle of a mission it kind of takes away from the experience. Publishers have to listen to the market because there are so many alternatives forms of gaming. Another revenue stream has been pay for play content. That is, using real world money for access to otherwise unavailable in-game content. When a game integrates this content well players are more than willing to fork over the extra cash to enhance their experience, and game publishers are getting better at this integration all the time. It seems developers are getting it right, last year revenues from online PC gaming exceeded 10 billion yuan for the first

While piracy would wreak havoc on more traditional consoles like Xbox or Playstation platforms, online gaming is unique in that if a player wants the real experience of an MMORPG, he must pony up the RMB for a subscription, or be left out. But that's not to say that free gaming options are not popular. In fact, the free to play model that is popular in the US for many online games actually grew from the piracy problem in China. Game companies knew that disks were easily imitated so they innovated, and began to offer their product for free online, and then offer micro-transactions in-game. As mentioned above, this style has crept into the Xbox and Playstation world and is used

heavily in the PC gaming world.

A few years ago, the internet café was the bread and butter of MMORG publishers with roughly 50 percent of revenue coming from internet cafes. At-home gaming is now the trend, boosted by broadband Internet development. The total revenue of China's online gaming market is expected to hit 55.7 billion yuan by the end of 2012, according to official statistics. But there is more than just vuan and jiao's up for grabs.

There is also a social communication element at play. Imagine the throngs of people who have gravitated to online gaming and MMORPG's specifically. More and more of their interactions with others are through the filter and in the context of the online games. The Chinese I know are very social. Whether it's dinning together or KTV, everybody likes to be out and about. And if you have been here

long enough you know that social interaction in China is very nuanced; there are rules that we as foreigners will never really understand, and plenty that we may never even discover. While we generally get a free pass as foreigners, the rules of etiquette in China can be pretty intricate. As people replace face to face interaction for online communication, it can't help but influence their real world interactions. While I did not observe too many friends that lost social skills due to gaming, there were some who you knew where spending too much time in front of a screen. They said more off color things without recognizing them as such. I can only imagine how well it must go over if a Chinese gamer forgets to guard the face of those around him. As gaming has gotten more and more popular a slang term has evolved for gamers,宅男 (zhainan) while the connotation is that of a nerd, the characters combine and translate literally to a male homebody, and describes one who has traded traditional social interactions for those available through channels like online gaming.

Regardless of how online gaming may influence young people in the future, it has become a major industry in China, and one that will see rapid growth as technology becomes more and more attainable to the average Chinese. There are even rumors about the ban on Xbox and Playstation consoles being lifted. Until that time the market will continue to be ruled by the online MMORPG's and browser games. For many young Chinese these games offer an outlet that does not require time to develop a skill like say picking up a sport. Rather, it is instant gratification and relaxation in the midst of a society that can be quite stressful, and game developers are more than happy to provide that release, for a fee of course.





Social Reject? Read On!

o, we've established in the few past articles that if you know people, they will help you find a job and if you don't know people, then you have to work on your networking skills and get to know people, who will then help you find a job.

In very few cases, you might just not be able to create this network of relationships and friendships. Even if you're very shy, I've experienced Chinese youth start conversations and I'm not even a Chinese speaker so I think it's not very difficult to get over your personal barriers get in touch with the community.

Nonetheless, there are always different personalities and different situations where you just can't form those bonds. In some cases, you might just not know the right places to start a professional network connection (by the way, wrong places include: night clubs, bars and KTVs!)

So now you need to start the long job finding journey on your own and it might not be pretty but it's possible. Let's list your choices. You can use expat magazines for the job ads (not very informative but might be a good lead to meeting a recruiter who might have other jobs in the drawer), you might also use a news paper (better, but would usually be exclusively in Chinese. If your Mandarin is good, you're certainly at an advantage here), or you can use the internet to job hunt and personally, I think that in this day and age, this is really the main way to go other than through personal connections.

Got your browser ready? Let me suggest you some websites to get you started:

www.51job.com is the largest job portal in China and you MUST try it.

www.chinahr.com is the oldest and maybe the most professional.

www.newjobs.com.cn is more social and involves meetings and fairs.

www.zhaopin.com is a third-party connecting companies to correct candidates.

There are more of course but I recommend you start with these four so you don't feel lost. Now, open these four websites on your browser and bookmark them because you're going to be using them a lot in the coming weeks. Also find yourself a browser that has good translation capabilities (I

You'll create your accounts and complete them with all your details. Now make sure that you write the correct title that suits your job target. I would also advise you to write beside your account title the following "expat: basic Chinese" and even better would be writing it in both English and Chinese. By the way, whenever I say Chinese, I mean Mandarin unless you're in Guangdong or Hong Kong, but that's another story.

You should be reading this in December (I'm writing it a bit earlier) and this is actually a very good time to get your online accounts ready and complete for the year's biggest hiring marathon. I'd like to point out that in China; the fiscal year coincides with the calendar year as opposed to most world countries.

This means that companies are getting their new budgets finalized for the next year right now as you're reading these lines and once they are back from the New Year holiday, they will start drafting the new positions they need to fill next year. Some weeks after the New Year holiday comes the Chinese New Year with the wonderful fireworks and amazing shows.

Watch, enjoy and get ready because once the Chinese New Year holiday is over, companies return to work, now ready with budgets, job descriptions and are hunting for talent. This will surely be the time to get this job you're looking for. But now that you know they are looking for you as well, how do you make that connection? You apply like there's no tomorrow through those websites to all of the opportunities that seem suitable and until a few hiring managers notice and contact you. Then?

How are you going to navigate this maze? Who's going to teach you the ins and outs of the job? How are you going to learn without losing precious career progression time? These are our topics for next month. Until then, I will gladly receive your comments & questions and will try to discuss them in the next article. Merry Christmas.

The Tianjin International Christian Fellowship enters a new chapter

The current Tianiin International Fellowship continues a long tradition of foreign Christians in Tianiin meeting for Sunday worship. Way back in the nineteenth century, to be a Western foreigner was to subscribe to some form of Christian faith, hence the mistaken belief that Christianity is a foreign faith. It was part of many Westerners' tradition to attend a church service on a Sunday and so, from the early days, services were held for and by Western Christians until the early 1950s when most could no longer stay.



With the opening up of China once more in the 1980s. foreigners returned, Christians naturally among them. They gathered to meet in a conference room of the Tianiin Binguan from September 1986 until April 1987 when they moved to the Intertech Building on You Yi Lu. Other foreigners from Nankai

University, the Foreign Language Institute and the growing business community began to attend. They moved from a small conference room to a spacious auditorium, although by 1996, people were spreading into the balcony at the rear. The warmth of the fellowship made up for the lack of

heating in winter when people used to bring their own blankets so they could wrap up. Different men took turns preaching, then as now. Particularly memorable was a sermon by Dr. West who illustrated it with a fresh pig's heart he'd bought in the local street market! Singing was usually acapello until a small

keyboard was obtained, and later an acoustic guitar and single microphone were added. There was no Sunday school for the children who sat in the service. Services were often followed by lunch in local restaurants. There was also support offered in some relief projects with flooding in Hebei in late 1996 and drought in 1997. At this time, a Mandarin-speaking fellowship had also started and met within the same building, starting a relationship between the two that has continued amicably up to today.



In 1998, redecoration of the Intertech resulted in TICF moving temporarily to a meeting place on Hong Qi Dao and then to the Travel College on Zi Jin Shan Lu. This was to be 'home' for both the Englishand Mandarin-speaking

Fellowships for the next 14 years! Many of the families who had been here in the early days moved on but there were always new families arriving and a Sunday School was started with parents volunteering. It became a full programme with children



doing a small annual Christmas performance.

The music team also developed with keyboard, electric quitars and drums and a more suitable public address system. There was also an influx of international students, a trend that has continued resulting in almost sixty nationalities being represented. They have participated a range of Fellowship-sponsored growth-nurturing activities. Other small groups have also emerged at different times for prayer, Bible study, singing. Sermons continued to be delivered by various members and the occasional visitor. Some weekend trainings were offered, for example regarding marriage, Further growth has occurred with the forming of a TEDA congregation from



years, often withstanding the inevitable movement

For the past 2 years, the leadership of the Tianiin International Christian Fellowship (TICF), as it has become known, has been seeking a new venue. At last, the fellowship itself

城中之城



his year when I left for England there were three universities in my road. When I came back, 7 weeks later, two had been completely removed from the face of the landscape and one is in the process of vanishing before my eyes. If you have been here for several years, remember Shi Fan Daxue at Ba Li Tai? This is a very important university and its speciality is training teachers. If you have learned Chinese



here the likelihood is that your teacher graduated from this school. However about three years ago they started to knock it down and upon enquiring as to what was going to happen, I was told that they were moving to University City. Have you ever been to University City? Have you ever even heard of University City? In the near future most universities will be located there and many have already relocated.

I already had experience of this place, as when I first came here I was studying Chinese at a university. One night soon after I arrived and had been out late, I got a taxi and told the driver the name of my university. I didn't recognise where he was taking me, but I put it down to the fact that I was not yet familiar with the place. However when we arrived we seemed to be in the countryside. there was no-one around, just huge building sites full of bulldozers and cranes, and one completed darkened building. I was really nervous and told the driver he had taken me to the wrong place. I had visions of him murdering me and leaving my battered and bloodied body buried under the rubble, (this is what living in London does for you). However I need not have worried, there were two branches of my university, the new branch was at University City, which was where he had taken me, I just was not aware of that at the time. He apologised and took me to the old branch without charging me any



Cheap and Cheerful

Property prices are rising higher and higher in Tianjin so as far as the universities are concerned, it is much cheaper for them to be located outside of the main areas. Each university itself is like a small town, with restaurants, supermarkets, hairdressers and myriad small shops and businesses. One university even has a veterinary surgery, which no doubt comes in handy as there are



many stray dogs and cats that roam the campuses. They offer reduced rates at this surgery so if any kind student finds an injured animal, they will be more inclined to seek medical help for it.

Dormitories are extremely cheap with some costing just 800 yuan per year. However for that you would be expected to sleep 8 to a room and many do not have air conditioning. Toilets and shower rooms are communal, so Chinese students get used to living with many other people. Personal space is a luxury and many people here do not have such a requirement anyway.

The shops on campus are also cheap as their customers are students and they know they cannot charge exorbitant prices. I often frequent these establishments as anyone can take advantage of what is on offer, discounted goods are not limited to students.

I visited the optician and bought several pairs of glasses at 100 yuan a pair. I even took some back to England with me.

Food For Thought

I came here to learn Chinese so originally I lived on campus. At first I found the food awful, the student canteens are full of unrecognisable things covered in slime and oil and everything tasted like cardboard, a full meal cost around 3 yuan so truly I was getting what I paid for. I rapidly lost weight. I remember one day I sat in the canteen with a bowl of slop in front of me and I almost broke down in tears. I pushed it away in despair, I just could not force it down my gullet. I didn't really have cooking facilities in the dormitory so I didn't know what I was going to do. The next day a fellow student invited me to lunch.

"No thanks I can't stomach the food in the canteen" I replied. She said "Student canteen? We don't eat there it is disgusting, we eat in the restaurants". That started a love affair between me and university restaurants. I hadn't realised there were other options, the canteens were at the very lowest end of the spectrum for cash strapped students. Universities are full of regular restaurants too, with the advantage that although they offer the same food, they are much cheaper. They also tend to be clean as the universities want the students in class and not off sick because of eating bad food.

The students often bemoan the fact that University City is in an inconvenient location. There are regular buses but they are always packed, hence there are unofficial taxis, which are really just men with cars who wait either outside the universities, or at bus stops at strategic locations looking for customers. I have used their services once or twice but patience and a very small body is needed, patience because it is only when you get in their vehicles that you realise they are waiting until they have enough passengers, which may be as many as eight, before they go, and with that many people in a little van it is very squashed. Small Chinese people don't mind this but for lanky westerners, it makes for a very uncomfortable journey. If I avail myself of their services I arrive at my destination bent double and I always have to unfold my limbs before I can actually walk.

Apart from the fact that it is much cheaper for the universities to be situated at this location, there is another reason for it. Chinese people like to have everything placed in boxes, so having all the universities in one location satisfies this ethic. The students have everything at hand that they need and they don't even have to leave the campus. This means that they can put all their efforts into studying without any of the distractions of outside life.

Now that we have line three on the Metro, you will find a stop almost at the end of the line called Da Xue Cheng, or University City. The new line has made life much more convenient for the students. When you have an hour or two to spare hop on the metro and go and have a look at University City, it makes for interesting viewing. It really is a city within a city.

REGO International School

Phil Armstrong, the principal of Rego International School is a man on a mission. Rego has always had a strong academic ethos, but he is not satisfied with resting on the laurels of the school's good reputation, he wants the school to strive ever onward and upward in order to help the students achieve their highest potential. He thinks learning should be a lifelong commitment and keenly pursues higher learning, a principle that has resulted in him being highly qualified for this job.

Rego is a British school and this means several things.

- 1. Attitude towards the students the school's educational approach focuses on individual students.
- 2. They fully recognise that every class has students of different abilities, therefore the teachers actively work to meet the needs of each student.
- 3. The examinations are the same as in Britain-GCSEs and A Levels, which are an internationally recognised standard.
- 4. Traditional customs are maintained, they have the old fashioned, effective house system, this is designed to bring the students closer together and learn the benefit of team work. The school awards certificates for achievements that the students obtain for their houses.
- 5. Most of the teachers are from Britain and they bring with them the expertise of working in a British school. The National Curriculum forms the basis of their educational system.

As Rego is a British school, student life there is extremely interesting, as they marry typically British cultural activities and festivals with international ones, i.e. they held a Guy Fawkes/bonfire night celebration in tandem with Halloween. I thought only British students would know who Guy Fawkes was, but the Rego students now all know.

Rego's core values are that students should lean to be knowledgeable, ambitious, independent, creative, principled and responsible. Whilst the school has a very strong academic record, its strength also lies in the fact that they emphasize the children should be happy and fulfilled in their school life.

Teaching the students to be principled is taken very seriously, hence in order to graduate, students aged 14-18 years of age must demonstrate that they have spent at least 15 hours each school year carrying out voluntary work, as part of their enrichment activities. This can take the form of anything from volunteering at an orphanage, to proactively doing things in connection with protection of the environment. As part of the enrichment process, normally school finishes at 3.30 p.m., but on Mondays and Thursdays there is a mandatory 4.30 finish and the students take part in activities designed to bring them closer together, for instance they have Wii dance sessions together.

Encouraging young people to engage in philanthropic activities will help them to develop into responsible, caring adults. Mr. Armstrong told me he is very interested in volunteer work in Africa and has taken students to Tanzania, they helped to raise funds for hospitals, build schools, and



support orphanages for runaways. It is a good thing to educate children that there are others far less fortunate than themselves. They should be made aware that the world they live in contains all kinds of people in varying circumstances, and that they personally can make a difference if they get involved in these kinds of activities.

School trips, whilst fun for the students, also have a purpose. A school trip to Japan including a visit to an orphanage. Mr. Armstrong is the right person to lead the children down this path, as when he was in the UK he was a staunch supporter of environmental groups and he took the lead in a Friends of the Earth group.

The school also likes to get the parents involved, and that night they were preparing for "An Evening of Excellence" at the Sheraton Hotel - an awards ceremony. The students would be given certificates in recognition for their achievements. Mr. Armstrong is an accomplished musician and that night would be giving a piano recital. Also the school was going to host ISCOT Science Day and visitors from other international schools would take part. They also get involved in interschool maths competitions.

There are currently no plans to renovate the school and he told me "We are very proud of our culture and attitudes and we want to further develop these things. There is no need to do any building work on the school, it is fine as it is, we wish to focus on the students, helping them to achieve their highest potential is paramount.

As far as their academic record is concerned, many students go on to enter some of the best world renowned universities. He told me about a former student who had got an offer to enter Cambridge University, but had turned it down in order to go to a university specialising in science subjects. There are not many people who are likely to get an offer from Cambridge, let alone turn it down, but such is the excellent standard of education provided by Rego that Mr. Armstrong seemed hardly surprised, he told me this in a rather matter of fact manner. The exam results are exceptional and this is partly due to the, I hesitate to use the word "relaxed" but hard working culture promoted by the teachers. Indeed it seems somewhat of a contradiction to say these words in the same breath, nevertheless it is true. It is a myth to think that the best students are those under pressure, happy students make for productive study and result in higher academic results.

As the majority of students do not have English as a first language, when students who struggle with the language start school



there they are placed in a spotlight programme, whereby they study English at an intensive level for 3 – 6 months before they join mainstream classes.

Mr. Armstrong is a father himself, he has two sons, and so he fully understands children and particularly the problems they have adapting to a different culture and language. He, his wife and his sons were all born on different continents, Mrs. Armstrong is Russian, one son was born in Switzerland and the other was born in Japan!

This is a Principal who clearly takes his responsibilities to his students very seriously and mutual respect is promoted at the school. He told me "We don't have a punishment system if students speak their mother tongue, we rigorously encourage them to speak English by reasoning with them that if they speak their mother tongue, they automatically exclude their classmates from participating in conversations. I have been teaching a long time and I feel this method is far more effective than excluding a child from lessons, that is counter-productive". I looked through the windows of the classrooms and I could see that the children were engaging with the teachers and diligently studying. Jalso think it is important to look at the local staff and see what kind of feelings are emanating from them. It seems that they are happy to work at the school too. Parents with children at Rego can relax, their children are in very good hands, there is a master captain at the helm of the Rego ship and he is steering the students to success.



Wellington College International Tianjin is quickly developing a reputation for putting on musical productions of a very high quality. Following the success of its sell-out musical show, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, Wellington has staged its second major musical production this year, Bugsy Malone, an action-packed song and dance extravaganza. This was again directed by Jane Griffiths, a professional singer, dancer, actress and director from London.

Bugsy Malone began life as a very successful film written and directed by Alan Parker, and featuring child actors, most notably Jodie Foster. Parker was trying to find a film that his children could enjoy, and his eldest son suggested one featuring a cast of just children. The plot is loosely based on events during the 1920s Prohibition era in the US, and more specifically, the exploits of Al Capone and Bugs Moran in Chicago. The film was later adapted into a stage show and its tongue-in-cheek style, starring children as the gangsters and their molls, makes it perfect for a school production.



Bugsy Malone is a slapstick musical comedy. The story line follows the rivalry between two half-witted street gangs, aided and abetted by a well-intentioned, one-time boxer, Bugsy Malone, who steps in to take control of Fat Sam's gang and give Dandy Dan and his boys what they've got coming to them. In this musical spoof, the message is one of good, clean fun. The characters are wonderful cartoon cut-outs and their weapons of choice 'splurge guns', or whipped cream and custard pies.

Jane Griffiths chose Bugsy Malone as a perfect vehicle to showcase the talents of a wide range of students at Wellington. The pupils taking part ranged from six to eighteen years of age. She said 'We knew

Bugsy Malone would be a sure-fire hit with both children and adults alike - not least because of its elaborate stage set, specially tailored period costumes and an enthusiastic cast of over 60 talented pupils". It was also quite challenging for both older students and younger students to

work together, because such a huge project demanded more patience and a strong spirit of team work.

The dramatic scenes were interwoven with vivid characterization and spectacular special effects, all against the backdrop of a very impressive stage set. This reflected long hours of rehearsing and hard work, all coming to fruition in a high quality performance. Of special note were the professional dance sequences. The audience was stunned by the audition scene, in which the actors interacted with the Headmaster, cast as the director, from the auditorium. 
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Friendship

s it easy for westerners to have Chinese friends? You may think that of course the answer is ves. and that it doesn't matter what nationality someone is. However it is challenging to be real friends with someone whose culture and thinking are polar opposites to yours. Although I have many Chinese friends, I don't find it particularly easy to be friends with them and I have to work hard at it. I feel I have to constantly watch what I say and do, as it is easy to offend them. For example a friend invited me to her house for lunch, her mother had prepared a feast for us and I said "Thank you for your hard work". My friend was horrified and said "You can't say that, that suggests she is a waitress". I thought that surely they would take into account the fact that I am a foreigner and we often make mistakes with the language and culture, but she wanted me to know that I had offended her mother

My most precious Chinese friend is like

a sister to me, but it is over simplistic to say that our nationalities have no bearing on our friendship. The differences in culture rear their head every day and we often have misunderstandings and differences of opinion. I don't understand why if my friends want to eat something particular I have to eat it too. Or if I say, for instance, that I do not want to go to the same place as

they want to, they will all change their plans to suit me, which makes me uncomfortable. No matter how many times I tell them to just go ahead and do what they want, they feel that they have to cater to me. This is a product of the legendary Chinese hospitality and the need to entertain guests. Even though I have lived here for four years and my friends know me very well, I



Another bone of contention is what is considered to be good manners. Where I come from you have to say please and thank you to everyone. I often get annoyed because if I ask a friend "Would you like coffee?" she just answers "hǎo" she doesn't say please, or thank me when I give her the coffee.

If I tell Mary something and a Chinese person tells her something different she will take their advice. When the Japanese Tsunami and the resulting disasters caused many to worry about radiation pollution, Mary received a text from a friend advising her to immediately buy lots of salt. Mary told



me to buy extra salt. "Eating lots of salt is foolish and dangerous, don't listen to these rumours. Who is your friend, is she a scientist?" I asked her witheringly. Mary bought extra salt.

What my friends say:-

Conversely my friends sometimes think I am very difficult, because of course I am not like them. They all like to be together and do the same things together. I don't feel that I always have to be with them. When my roommate went back to her country for two weeks Mary phoned me up and said "You must be lonely living by yourself. I can come and stay with you". What she didn't know was that I was dancing a jig even as I was seeing my roommate off. I was revelling in the two weeks of freedom that would follow. two weeks of doing exactly as I liked without having to consider her. "No, it's okay I am quite happy on my own" I said. Mary couldn't believe it, how could I be happy on my own? She is used to living with lots of people, when she goes back to her hometown four people sleep in the same huge bed. When she was at university there were 8 people to one room. When she moved out of the dormitory she rented a room with six others. Chinese people get used to sharing their space with others and so do not like to do things on their own.

As food is such a big deal, my friends

will all discuss what to eat in great detail, but I am interested in what is going on in the world, I want to discuss the destruction of the environment or the war in Afghanistan etc., I am not interested in having lengthy conversations about where to eat and what to eat. My Chinese friends are too kind and always worry about me. I don't show consideration for them by co-operating with plans for the mutual good of the group. They feel I am not grateful for their concern.

Once a friend phoned me up in the morning when I was running late and the conversation went like this:-

Her: "Good morning, have you eaten vour breakfast?"

Me: "Not vet".

Her: "Oh. What are you going to have

Me: "I don't know".

Her: "How about this evening, what will you have for dinner?"

Me: "I haven't even thought about breakfast yet, how do I know what I will eat for lunch and dinner". I was exasperated, I was trying to get ready and I was involved in a pointless conversation. Now I know the reason she was asking was that she thought we could eat together. I was considered selfish because I didn't worry about her eating on her own.

My insistence on them saying please and

thank you is a problem in their eyes because this means that our relationship is not very close. They tell me this lack of courtesy proves that we are good friends and there is no need to stand on ceremony. Apparently the closer the relationship is the more "free" they can be and the more liberties they can take. My opinion is that only strangers should try to take liberties with me.

They cannot offer me help and advice as I don't take it, but offering help is part and parcel of Chinese culture. By rejecting their advice as not suitable for me, they think that I do not value them. They cannot shape me into their homogenized mould. They tell me my hair is strange, and that Chinese people do not have such hair. I tell them, unnecessarily, that I am not Chinese. I look different, my thinking is different, I don't care for their personal opinions on my business - I am a problem. Chinese friends are loval, kind, and helpful, but I am not kind and I don't need

They think it is hard to be friends with me, I think it is hard to be friends with them. My Chinese friends drive me crazy, I drive them crazy. Why are they still willing to be friends with me? I don't know. However what I can say is, the best thing about being in China is having Chinese friends. I love them to death.





A Real Real Estate Bubble: How Nagging Mothers In Law Could Hurt The Chinese Economy

总体来讲,中国的地产业和西方不同。确切的说,土地的所有权完全归国家所有。而且长期以来,房子都是由工作单位分配的,不是个人购买的一件商品。实际上,这种社会现象一直持续到90年代后期,中国大陆地区的房屋货币交易几乎没有市场。生活80年代的人们几乎都是由工作单位根据其工作年限、年龄、家庭成员数量分配住房。因此,住房条件并没有成为适婚青年男女组建家庭的绊脚石。甚至在地产经济飞速发展的今天,你仍然可以听到一些老人在一起用话家常,感叹现在生活方式变化之大的同时,不禁怀念改革开放初期那段住房无压力的时光。

Regardless of where you are from, the relationship one has with a mother in law is almost always a pain. They can nag, and pry, and make you feel you've descended into the seventh circle of hell in some cases. While this can be a strain on any marriage, it rarely has nationwide economic implications; unless you happen to live in China, where the mothers of potential brides vet would-be suitors on their possession of real estate above most anything else. I am not just picking on in-laws here, the Confucian ideal of the man as the sole provider is also contributing factor that reinforces the unwritten law that a man without a house is a

man destined to bachelordom. While to me that sounds like an awesome way to dodge the marriage bullet, it has major economic consequences for China.

Real estate in China is a bit different from the West. Technically all land is owned by the state. For many years a home was not something one purchased, but was something one was assigned. Most housing was doled out by one's work unit (danwei). In fact, up until the late 1990's there was no monetized market for real estate on the mainland; the government giveth and the government taketh away. Most people in the 80's were assigned housing by their danwei, according to one's





seniority, age, and family size. Housing was modest but essentially free and did not really enter the equation when courting a mate. Even with the rapid development and prosperity of many Chinese you will still hear older generations lamenting the simpler times of a China pre-Opening and Reform. While every grandparent is guilty of viewing the past with rose colored glasses, in China the change in lifestyle, including the pressures of home ownership, have been dramatic ones to say the least. As to the China of today, let's check the numbers.

-The Chinese real estate market accounted for 13% of China's GDP growth last year, that's more than exports by the way.

-Between 1998 and 2008 14.4 billion square meters of residential housing space were constructed in China. For perspective, that is 160 times the residential space of the entire island of Manhattan.

According to HSBC, the value of real estate wealth in 2010 was USD 17 trillion, which is more than 3 times China's GDP.

In the US the housing cost to income ratio (annual salary versus the cost of a home) is 3 to 1. According to JP Morgan, in China that ratio is 13 to 1. Do you have over a decade's worth of income on hand so you can get married? Neither do many Chinese men. The pressure to marry is high, but so are home prices. Interestingly, rental prices have not kept pace with purchasing prices, they have remained relatively low. This means that the incredible increase in home prices is not being driven by a demand for housing per se, China

does have plenty of space available to live in, to the point that many housing developments sit empty for years. The driving force rather is a confluence of other factors like societal pressure to marry into a home, and using real estate as a safe investment.

The skewed gender and age demographics of China are creating hardship for those left outside of the real estate bubble, and creating a class of marriage 'untouchables'. The Male to female ratio is currently 120 males to 100 females. Chinese guys are searching for mates who, along with their mother, expect a home as a prerequisite for marriage. This ratio is expected to increase in the future as males are generally favored both historically and economically for their earning potential. The one child policy has

also hurt males who do not come from families of means. The 4-2-1 family describes the typical Chinese family post-One Child Policy. That is, four grandparents, two parents, and at the center of it all, the one child, Generally speaking, Chinese grandparents (a demographic with more members every day) and parents are more than willing to pitch in and help their son purchase a home as he tries to find a wife. If a man does not have the advantage of independent wealth, or help from older family members, his chances of courting a mate fall drastically. At the bottom of the demographic heap are male laborers especially from the villages of China. Many females leave the village in search of work, or suitors, in the cities. From any angle, the cards are heavily stacked against uneducated male laborers who are choosing from an ever shrinking pool, and competing with a city male who may well come from 4-2-1 families. When it comes to social and family pressures about marriage, this demographic has become untouchable in the eyes of many Chinese.

Since Opening and Reform Chinese policies have been aimed at rapid development. A city can grow skyscrapers overnight. Now the government must manage the giant of this growing real estate bubble. While it has been a major driver of the economy, if prices falter, the affects will be felt nationally as well as abroad. China's real estate craving increases the prices of everything from copper to concrete and any building material in between, if that bubble does burst in a big way, the ripple will be felt across multiple sectors. There have been attempts to control how many homes individuals can buy, but it has done little to slow the hunger for real estate investment. While this sounds like a setup for a huge bubble burst similar to that of the US, there are some key differences.



In the US, families were getting home loans for essentially no down payment, and at historically low interest rates. The government pushed banks to make lunatic loans to people who did not really qualify for them, and banks were not regulated properly and started selling toxic mortgage backed securities, and so the bubble grew and eventually burst. In China, families have much more skin in the game, meaning their down payments for a home might be as high as 40% or 50%, making a default personally crushing, and discouraging mass defaults that would make for systemic risk. Chinese leaders are hoping this will help to keep the bottom from falling out of the market. However, they are left with a very difficult choice; allow the bubble to continue to grow in the near term and hope for the best in the future, or, attempt to cool the market now and risk and overcooling of the economy more generally.

One does not always consider cultural factors when looking at economic issues, but in the case of the bubbling Chinese real estate market, one cannot really understand the market without some knowledge of the culture driving it. When my Chinese friends explain the family pressure involved with marriage in China, I must admit the level of power that parents hold over their adult children makes me cringe a bit. While your mother in law may be a pain, at least she's not helping to drive a bubble in your home country that could burst and devastate your economy.

s there a better place in the world to buy presents? No! Why? Firstly, there are no Christmas "sales" that, after all, are only an excuse to bump up prices for maximum profit in the mad rush up to Christmas. If you don't believe me then why do all the stores have massive Boxing Day sales where prices are about half what they were only a couple of days ago? Secondly, there are no long queues to buy this year's must have present or the disappointment of missing out because they sold out. Thirdly, if you forget a present you can pop down to the store on Christmas morning because in China it is just another

In TEDA, where I live, I have two favourite places for buying presents. We are spoilt down here because we have some of the best value shopping in China. It is so good that it I recommend jumping on the train and coming down here to check it out. Your first stop should be Decathlon which is a sports' store that has some of the best clothes, sporting gear and accessories that you could wish for. If you are of a sporting bent, whatever your interest - be it snorkeling, camping, cycling, hiking, tennis

- absolutely whatever, you will find something of interest here. Not only do they have a great selection, everything is so cheap

Nearby, in Tang gu, we have the enormous Yang Huo market where if you can't find what vou're looking for, it probably doesn't exist. There are toys galore and they are so much cheaper than in any store. It is so much better than a store because most places will bargain if you are not happy with the price. If you know what you want, get a Chinese friend to go with you and see what price they can get for you. My Chinese wife is often able to get most goods at a great reduction from the original price. At Yang Huo you should never pay the original asking price. It is easy to get to as Tang gu station is on the train line from Tianjin.

There are dozens of stalls selling all kinds of clothing, perfume, handbags, camping gear, bicycles, watches, the list is almost endless. Now, I am not so naive that I don't know that some of the products may not be real but if that were so you would not be getting them so cheap. However, with many products, it is almost impossible to tell the

difference between them and the real deal. That is, except for the price, which will be only a fraction of the genuine article. One warning though, be careful with computer gear like USBs which promise 880 GB. Like my grandmother used to say, "If it sounds too good to be true, it usually isn't."

Every once in a while I get up to Tianiin and when I do, I always visit Ancient Culture Street. If you want to get some presents to take home which have a distinct Chinese flavor, this is the place to go. It is also an interesting area to visit architecturally and there are literally hundreds of stores selling Chinese curios and handicrafts. If you are looking for a souvenir or a gift you could buy some jade, a tea set, swords, silk, paintings or sculpture. The traders are always friendly and you can always look without feeling any pressure to buy. If you are really lucky you might be able to pick up a real antique at a bargain basement price.

Chinese Flavors

ost of us would love to know how to make authentic Chinese dishes because we can then make them for our friends when we go back to our own country. We can always spin a story like: this is a dish that I learned to make when I was in Tianjin. I got it from an elderly lady that lived in a flat on the floor below mine. Tales like this are sure to impress our less adventurous stay at home friends. Furthermore, we get to use the "mysterious" Chinese ingredients that

we used to never buy from a local Chinese

make something extraordinary that will convince the judges that your dish is better than your competitor's. Just how easy is that!

supermarket which we probably never

learn how to make these Chinese delicacies.

Well, here is your chance. Today we are going

to play the popular TV show "Master Chef".

Actually, we are going to play the Chinese

TV version which is called "Zhongguo

Weidao". The idea behind these programs is

that you and a competitor are given a random

selection of ingredients. You then have a set

time limit to combine these ingredients to

But before we can do this we have to

frequented before.

To begin, here are our first lot of ingredients: two eggs, flour, leeks, cooking oil and salt. We have thirty minutes to make them into something that will impress the judges. Are you ready?

Your time starts...now! First, put the flour in mixing bowl and add some water. Mix it all up until it becomes doughy. Let the dough sit for a while. While we are

waiting, we will chop up the leeks. Then put the cooking oil into the pan, add the eggs and beat them up. Now, let it cool. When it is cool, we will mix it with the leeks. This will be the filling for our...dumplings!

If you want, you can now add meat to the mix. I don't do meat so I will give it a miss. Now, you need a rolling pin and a hard surface to roll out the dumpling pastry. Take the doughy flour mix and flatten with the rolling pin into a circle with a diameter of about 5 centimetre. Add the filling and fold the flattened mix into a triangular shape with serrated edges. It might take a bit of practice getting the shape right. Put a little cooking oil in the pan and fry the dumplings. After three or four minutes add some water and continue cooking until the outside is golden brown.

Take out the dumplings and serve them hot to your friends. If you want, you can put the left over dumplings, if you have any that is, in the freezer where they will keep for months. You can take them out any time you feel peckish and steam or fry them. This is a great recipe to keep for Chinese New Year so you can have an authentic Spring Festival

party with your friends wherever you are in the world. The ingredients are things that you would find in any kitchen in the world. The hardest part is folding the dumplings but like anything, persevere, practice makes perfect.

Congratulations. We have now won through to the second round of "Zhongguo Weidao". The judges loved our dumplings. Our next lot of ingredients are: a piece of soft tofu, a bunch of Chinese onions, one small red pepper, a sharp knife, broad bean paste, pan, dian fen – in Chinese 淀粉also known as starch, MSG, salt, cooking oil. I know what we can make. Of course, it is Sichuan Ma La Dofu: one of the most famous and popular dishes in China. Our time starts now! First, drain and then cut up the soft tofu into cubes of

about one square centimetre.

Next chop up the
Chinese onions and the red
pepper. Then put some
water into the fry pan and
heat it up. Now, add the
diced up tofu. When the
water has boiled turn

down heat and put the tofu aside for the moment in a bowl of cold water. Then, with the water still in the pan, turn the fry pan back onto medium and put in some cooking oil, then add the Chinese onion, red pepper and the broad bean paste, with a pinch of salt. This dish is often cooked with pork. I won't add any in but you can if you wish. If you want you can add the diced pork now.

Simmer this mix for two or three minutes, if you added pork, maybe continue for a bit longer to ensure that the pork is well cooked enough. Then, add the eggplant and green pepper into small pieces, cubes of about a centimeter will do fine. Put the eggplant and pepper to one side for the moment. Heat up a pan with the cooking oil and cook the chopped potato until it is golden brown and then remove. We will use this later. While waiting for the potato to cook, we can chop up the Chinese onion and slice the garlic and ginger. Once you have removed the potato, start cooking the eggplant until it looks done, don't let it burn, and remove it as well. It's looking good.

Now, cook the chopped up Chinese onion, green pepper, sliced ginger and garlic. Add some sova sauce.

> vinegar and a little sugar and mix thoroughly. When it smells great and

almost ready, add the cooked potato and eggplant and continue mixing.

Finally, add a little water and salt, then a teaspoon of corn starch mixed with water. It should thicken a little. This means it is ready. You have just made Tudi San Dian, 土地三鲜. You await the judges' verdict. They look pleased and give you the thumbs up. The audience applauds. You wait to see if you have won.

Congratulations! You have won this week's episode of "Zhongguo Weidao". The judges ask you, "What is your secret? How come a wai guo ren is so good at Chinese cooking?" You blush a little and are a bit embarrassed to tell them that you have some Chinese friends who helped you buy the ingredients and that you read an article in Jin magazine that gave you all the recipes. But who cares? You are now a famous Chinese master cheft



and simmer again for about three minutes. Then add the starch and cook for about a minute until it thickens up a little. Now you can add a pinch of MSG or even a bit more to give it a bit of kick if desired. The tofu should have turned a light brown colour. Now it is ready to serve. Make sure you have some rice on hand. This dish is a Sichuan specialty and famous throughout China.

The judges loved this as well and now you are through to the final round of "Zhingguo Weidao". We might have to try something a bit harder this time to impress the judges and show our expertise. Our ingredients this time are: a potato, an eggplant, a green pepper, a Chinese onion, sugar, garlic, starch (used previously), pepper, salt, vinegar, soya sauce, ginger, cooking oil. Our thirty minutes starts now! First ,we need to peel the potato and wash it. Once we've done that we also need to wash the green pepper and eggplant, got to make sure they are clean.

Now, we need to chop up the potato,

lobster soup which tasted of the deep blue sea. Then, we tried the deep fried codfish which was served with some cuttlefish and rice. This is a creative and absolutely delicious combination that is sure to whet the appetite of local diners.

The menu, is to say the least,

extremely innovative in the way it uses the different ingredients. It is suggested that you book at least one day in advance because the chef







Young Heir of Traditional Clay Figurine Crafts



Hou Yu began to learn the traditional colored figurine making called Clay Figure Zhang when he was just 16. Initially, he was enrolled at the Tianjin Academy of Art to study western sculpture. By combining Chinese traditional colored figurine making with the skeletal anatomy commonly used in western sculpture theory, Hou Yu began to make creations that were much more natural and vivid. When he was twenty-one he started in the workshop of Clay Figure Zhang.

During his seven years in the workshop, his works have helped to make it a financial success and it has won awards and the recognition from Chinese and foreign art collectors. In the process he has been experimenting with many different materials, including wax, copper and stainless steel. He is particularly skilled at portraiture and his custom-made works have received many plaudits from his many satisfied customers.

In 2008, he began a project with the Chinese Film Museum to make wax figurines from classic Chinese movies. Since then his works have been displayed at the museum. In the same year, he had an exhibition of his works at the First Tianjin Folk Art Exhibition where he won an award.

While still using his skill in the craft of Chinese colored sculpture, Hou Yu has also integrated new technologies and techniques such as casting them in bronze, which has further enhanced the value and longevity of his works.

This statue is of the Chinese Pure Land Buddhism founder. It is a realistically painted sculpture. This kind of sculpture is best known for its life-like depictions and simple coloring. The conjunction of Chinese traditional techniques and the western emphasis on realistic reproduction of human anatomy has greatly improved Chinese painted sculpture art. All of these statues are representations of historical Buddhist masters who were responsible for great achievements in their lives.

Chinese Buddhists have traditionally viewed the practice of meditation and the recitation of Amit abha Buddha's name as the easiest way to achieve enlightenment. The reciting may be done vocally or mentally. In Chinese Buddhism, there is also a related practice called the "dual path of Pure Land cultivation", also known as the "dual path of emptiness and existence". In this type of meditation the name of Amit abha Buddha is recited slowly while the mind is emptied of all thoughts and concentrated on the incantation. When idle thoughts do arise, the phrase is repeated again to chase them away. With constant practice, the mind is able to remain empty and at peace. This is the ultimate aim of the practice - the attainment of Samadhi.





In this figure Hou Yu has portrayed an old man from the late Qing Dynasty sitting on a rock while enjoying the afternoon sunshine with his bird. He is dressed plainly and has a satisfied look on his face. The old man is obviously a well-educated member of the upper-class but due to the turbulent times, he has chosen to live a life of solitude rather than fight to defend his societal position. Although the man is living a simple life in his later years, he still feels happy. This figurine expresses the creator's understanding that real happiness is not achieved through money or power.

This statue is of the Master Xu Yun and was ordered by a Shanxi temple. It shows him in a meditative state. Xu Yun (1840-1959) was a renowned Buddhist master and one of the most influential Buddhist teachers of the last 200 years.

Guangzhou, a city with Food from the Heart


uangzhou is the capital city of Guangdong province in the far southern neck of China with beautiful Hainan island in the distance. It is also, more importantly, the capital city of dim sum (or dian xin 点心 in Mandarin).

Ah, dim sum. No trip to Guangzhou can possibly be complete without some good quality dim sum. One of my most cherished memories while visiting the Chinatowns in America were the numerous dim sum outings that my Chinese American family shared together. Dim Sum, which literally means "touch the heart", is a special type of Cantonese dining experience, where a great diversity of bite sized hunger quenching delights, which range from steamed, fried, boiled, baked... you name it... are served in bowls, plates, steamers, baskets, lotus leaves ... you name it (again)... all to your heart's content. It's almost like a mini buffet semi neatly arranged around your table and just within range of your chopsticks.

Except for the lack of push carts served by boisterous serving ladies, which is sadly now a pastime, the whole dim sum experience is one of the most colorful and memorable dining interactions one can have in China and Guangzhou has it all. But make sure you bring a friend or six for the food served can accumulate to epically vast

proportions. Loud conversation, without fear of disturbing others since they will most likely be just as equally noisy, should also accompany your meal.

Cha Siu Bows (Cha Shao Bao 叉烧包 in Mandarin), or steamed white bread with BBQ





the dozen at the Chinese bakery in America and when I first arrived in Tianjin, I remember scratching my head in confusion as to why I had trouble finding any. In Guangzhou, you can easily find them at the small mom and pop shops as well as those

Har Gow(虾饺 ha gaau) and Siu Mai (烧麦 siu maai) are for those dumpling fans out there. Har Gow are a kind of shrimp dumpling enclosed by an almost transparent juicy white skin. The thinner and stronger the skin is, the better the quality. Siu Mai are stuffed with minced pork and shrimp with a sprinkle of mushroom on top. It's great for meat lovers for the meat stuffing is larger than the skin

Cheung Fan (肠粉)was probably the most talked about dish amongst the locals (especially young students). It's basically a stretched out flat rice noodle that's rolled up with either: BBQ pork, shrimp or beef. Small specialty shops along Guangzhou's old street are packed during the weekends because of the famous Cheung Fan. Make sure you pour their specialty soy sauce on top before

For those with more exotic tastes, the





chicken feet, or phoenix claws for purists (凤 爪 fung zao), come in two kinds: the brownish salty ones whose skin melts off the bones and the slightly tougher white ones, or bai vun feng jiao. In northern Guangzhou, there are a series of mountains called Bai Yun Shan. The water from these mountains was originally used for the special flavoring used to make white chicken feet.

Another exotic dish for those brave enough is the tripe (Stomach 牛肚 / 金钱肚) mixed with a vinegar like sauce. While one may balk at the mention of stomach, one thing I can argue is that it doesn't taste as strong as liver so therefore, my preference has always been stomach.

Lo Mai Gai (糯米鸡), or sticky rice wrapped in lotus leaves, can be found almost everywhere in Guangdong Province. Different variations of it are a popular seller at many of the mountain villages clustered around the entrance to numerous trails and hikes. They are quite similar to Zhong Zi which are usually smaller and served during the Dragon Boat Festival Holidays.

Luo Bo Gao, (萝卜糕 Catonese: lo4 baak6 goul) a special fried turnip cake, is actually quite good thanks to its extra crispy exterior. Sometimes it's cooked more than once until golden brown and chopped into cubes. You can add chili for that extra little kick

Rice Porridge (Cantonese: Juk 粥 Mandarin: Zhou) comes in a variety of styles including thin meat porridge (Mandarin: Shou Rou Zho 瘦肉粥), duck egg porridge (Mandarin: pei dan zhou 皮蛋粥), fish or a combination. It tastes great and warm especially during the winter.

If all this sounds a bit too out of the ordinary, a traditionalist can stick to the famous Cantonese spare ribs (排骨 paai4 gwat1), or the steamed beef balls. And that's basically what they are. You get what you ask for and you can't go wrong with either one of these dishes. Many of the beef balls come in soups as well and can be bought from the numerous food stands dotted along many of the major snack streets.

And of course, no one should forget dessert. While in general, dessert isn't really the most popular portion of the meal in China (that is, if you prefer ice cream sundaes over oranges), dim sum has plenty to offer. And the interesting catch is that, often times, you

can have the opportunity to eat dessert first it just so happens to have been made at the time of ordering. Besides, it's best to get things fresh before the other patrons do.

Baak Tong Gou (白糖糕) is a kind of sweet flavored, cold, gelatinous triangle. If this rather terse description turns you off, then think again. The sweet candy combo flavor will make vou a true believer when it comes to eating things with disgusting sounding names like a "sweet, cold, gelatinous triangle." And it's great finger food too. Note that most

Baak tong gou is more readily available in Hong Kong.

Dan Tat (蛋挞 dan ta) have been all around China but Guangdong is where they came from. They are the most crispy, fresh and warm that I've ever tasted. They are my younger sister's favorite dish and as one of her old sayings goes, "If the dan taat sucks here, everything else will suck!"

One last dish I must mention is the Jian dui (煎堆). They consist of deep fried flavorful rice flour covered with sesame seeds all around. Red bean is stuffed within to give it a sweet flavor. This is also a popular dish with westerners.

Guangzhou does have its share of tourist sites scattered across the city (Yexiu park, Shamian Island and the intriguing Wampoa Military Academy) but for most people, both Western and Chinese, the most memorable experience comes from Guangzhou's true heart, the dim sum. The old section of Guangzhou which consists of the two combined main streets of Xia jiulu and Shang jiulu are perfect for trying out the cheungfan




(BBQ pork rolled up in a rice blanket) and zhou (rice porridge). You can also take in some of the historic architecture and the colorful traditional Cantonese windows and alleys in addition to the great food. Normally, one of the worst tourist catchphrases that I often hear is: "If you haven't tried or seen the (special food item), then you can't say that you've been to (city name)." For Guangzhou, I will have to make an exception, "If you haven't tried the dim sum, then you can't say you've been to Guangzhou (or Hong Kong)!'

It is fitting that the last article of the year in the Natural China series should be about the Giant Panda. Who does not love them? Though all animals are unique and wonderful, the Giant Panda definitely has captured the hearts of most people. Why are we so enamoured of Pandas? Maybe it is because they only come from China and are therefore rare, or maybe it is because they look exactly like toy bears, there is something not quite real about them. There is a debate going on as to whether they are actually bears or whether they are a type of raccoon. I am not one to be bothered by technical details, as far as I am concerned they look like bears.

I am not going tell you what you already know about pandas, i.e. that they eat bamboo and they are threatened because of disappearing habitat and low breeding rates etc. What I would like to do is hopefully tell you something you don't know. For instance, I am sure you could all name the first man to introduce Pandas to western world? How about the name of the first Panda to go to America? Below are some facts about these marvellous creatures.

Panda Fact 1: All pandas belong to China and any that are in overseas zoos are only on loan for a yearly sum of around £650,000, which is a lot of yuan.

Panda Fact 2: Any cubs that are born to overseas pandas are sent back to China within two years.

Panda Fact 3: It is quite difficult for the females to get pregnant as they are only in heat for 72 hours over the entire year and can only conceive during a 24 hour slot.

Panda Fact 4: Pandas are white bears with black bits. A clearer division of colours in mammals could not be found except perhaps in the zebra. It looks as though someone has painted their eye sockets and arms and legs black after realising there were already large white bears in the form of Polar bears!

Panda Fact 5: Although Pandas exist solely on bamboo, their digestive systems can accept other foods and they have been known at times to eat rodents.

Panda Fact 6: In July of this year the first panda to be born in 24 years at Japan's Ueno Zoo, Tokyo died only 6 days after being born, leaving staff devastated.

Panda Fact 7: There are no pandas in zoos in England although Edinburgh Zoo in Scotland welcomed two last year. Are there any in your City?

Panda Fact 8: Because of the low nutrition and energy they get from bamboo, they basically have to eat all day.

Panda Fact 9: Pandas are solitary creatures and only meet occasionally to mate.

Panda Fact 10: The man who first introduced the panda to America and indeed the Western world was called Quentin Young. The panda's name was Su-Lin and the year was 1936

Although many animals have either disappeared or are endangered due to overeating, by humans that is, the Chinese Government has a vigorous conservation programme, and so at least for the ones in captivity in the breeding centre at Chengdu, pandas are faring well and they are safe for the time being. How many of us have seen a live panda? Not many probably. As I am living in the land of the Giant Panda, I hope that I will get an opportunity to see them before I leave these shores.

Chinese Poetry

hina has a long and proud history of incredible achievements in many areas including literature, architecture and science. When Europe was in the Dark Ages, Chinese culture was flourishing. The Tang Dynasty (618-917) was a period of great progress in all aspects of culture but especially in the arts and particularly in poetry. Poetry was an important part of life at all levels and this period is considered to be the Golden Age of Chinese poetry.

In the Tang Dynasty poets and poetry were celebrated. Nearly 50,000 poems have survived from the pens of more than 2,000 individual poets. Poetry was seen as important. If you wished to progress through the government ranks proficiency in writing poetry was a prerequisite. The imperial examination even had a poetry writing task. There were also poetry contests among the elite which provided entertainment for those at their banquets.

Most Chinese learn some Tang Dynasty poetry at school and will be able to rattle off a few lines on request. One sure fire way of impressing any Chinese person you know is to be able to recite some Tang poetry. They will be even more impressed if you know a line or two in English and even more if you can recite a whole poem. As most of them are only four lines it is not too hard to learn. If you really want to impress, try to learn and

recite it in the original Chinese.

One influential poet from this era is Li Bai who was born in Central Asia in 701 and died in 762. He led a highly wild youth and liked to play with swords. He is said to have killed several men before he was 20 over matters of honour. He never really settled down and was a wanderer most of his life. He wanted a job in the government but did not do anything about it. He wrote poems on many subjects, one of his most well-known is "Thoughts on a Still Night":

Before my bed, the moon is shining bright, I think that it is frost upon the ground. I raise my head and look at the bright moon, I lower my head and think of home.

This poem is well known to most Chinese people and many can recite it. Even today, school children are required to memorise it. He was fond of a drink but even when drunk was capable of delivering poems of great beauty on the spot. He wrote about the lives of the people, the magnificent scenery he saw on his travels and his wishes and regrets. He was quite famous and influential and in his travels he met many people including Du Fu.

Du Fu was another great poet of this time. He was born in 712 in Henan and died in 770. As a child he was a prolific reader. Many consider him the greatest of Chinese poets and one of the greatest writers ever. Like Li Bai, he was a wanderer who never stayed in the same place for long. He was usually poor and starving. He liked a drink as well, one of poems is "Many People Come to Visit and Bring Wine After I Fell Off My Horse, Drunk"

The moon's reflected on the river a few feet away, A lantern shines in the night near the third watch. On the sand, egrets sleep, peacefully curled together, Behind the boat I hear the splash of jumping fish.

His life was very different to that of Li Bai who spent some of his life in the court of the emperor. My favourite Du Fu verse is from "Spring View" which has the famous line "A letter from home would be worth uncountable gold". Change letter to email and the line is one that still rings with meaning to many people in the world today. That, truly, is a sign of great literature, poetry that still speaks to people more than 1200 years after it is written.

Rego UN Day

The annual UN Day activities and celebration of Tianjin Rego International School took place on October 24, the birth date of the United Nations. UN Day is one the most important activities at Rego as it provides the opportunity to celebrate the internationalism, uniqueness and broader sense of community. The day began with Rego's traditional parade to show the diverse cultures that make up the school population. The parade ended in the theater where students, parents
