Automobile Restrictions Issued in Tianiin

■ 天津实行汽车限牌限号政策

天津市政府12月15日晚19:00正式召开发布会向公众发布。自12月16日零 时开始天津汽车实施汽车牌照无偿据号与荷偿竞价相结合的限牌推施。2014 年3月1日开始实施爬行推婚、每日和每周限行的尾号与北京一致。

记者获悉,从16日0时起,天津将实行小客车限牌限行措施。小客车牌照 发放将采取无偿据号和有偿拍卖相结合的方式。

Tianjin will restrict issuance of new car licenses. The city authorities of Tianiin announced on 15th that from December 16th, motorists would have to get a number plate by either bidding in an auction or taking part in a lottery. The aim was to reduce congestion and combat air pollution.

It will also introduce a quota system similar to Beijing's traffic restriction scheme, which allows cars access to the city on certain days depending on the last digit of their plates, the official Xinhua news agency quoted Miao Hongwei, head of the city's traffic management bureau, as saying.

All the 45 shops were crowded with buyers who rushed to buy a car before the ban took effect the next day. Automobile dealers stayed open late till midnight on 15th to handle the business and some sold most of their cars in stock.

Jackie Chan's Int'l Stunt Park settles in Tianjin

Shanghai-based Greenland Group signed a deal with kung fu star Jackie Chan and his stunt team to develop an international stunt park in Jixian, Tianlin.

The project, with a total investment of 1 billion yuan (\$164) million), covers an area of 330,000 square meters and will be located in the Panshan Mountain scenic area in Jixian county.

The park, as Jackie Chan stunt team's largest training center, is a new trial for Greenland Group to expand its business into real estate project themed on culture sector.

Greenland Group, which was listed in Hong Kong in August, will see its total assets exceed 300 billion yuan this year, with the compound annual growth rate exceeding 40 percent. The company's revenue will grow to 400 billion yuan next year and 500 billion yuan in 2015, according to the company's top management.

Tianjin Launched China's Fifth Carbon Market

The northern city of more than 10 million people with a GDP the size of Ireland's is following Beijing, Shanghai, Shenzhen and Guangdong province in launching carbon markets, as the world's biggest-emitting nation strives to control its impact on climate

Tianjin was rushing to launch its emissions market before the end of 2013, in order to comply with the central government policy that China's regional pilot markets should begin this year, the source said.

Metro Line 3 Extends to South Railway Station in Year End

The new line is planned to start trial operation by the end of the year. Nanzhan is Tianjin South Railway Station. Soon, all the train stations in Tianjin, including Tianjin Railway Station, West Station, North Station and South Station, will be linked to the metro network. It will also make it more convenient for passengers for the Beijing Shanghai bullet train.

IN PRAISE OF TIANJIN



天津是我孽爱的城市。虽然我是外国人,但是特别不能容忍别人批评天 津。其实我们已经看到天津有了恨大的发展,每天都有新变化。我相信,人 们恨快会认识到天津的价值,蜂拥到这座城市。现在就让我们看看天津献予 我们多么丰富的生活资源!

子女教育

只要你到天津几所国际单校考察一下就会发现,这里的数学设施和数学 大概都是世界一流的。这里的学生很少会说讨厌上学,因为银重要的一个原 因就是这里银少有校园暴力事件。除了单校对暴力事件的零客忍态度,这些 孩子们因为都生活在异国他乡,所以彼此之间更加依赖,更容易形成互助友 爱的关系。这些学校注重培养孩子的横向恶维和解决问题的能力,重视体育 教育和团队精神,让孩子们医学到知识又能保持愉快的心情。

須店业施助发展

一个经商的朋友告诉我,高档酒店相继开业说明天津发展得很好,有利于提升城市形象。他说的没错,正是有了这些酒店,才让这座城市的天际线变得如此之差。

但是有些没到过天津的人还不了解这些。我的一个朋友替经说要来天 津,但他的太太却对天津兴趣不大。她可能觉得天津没什么可看的,也只有 小旅馆可以住。我只能说她的无知令她失去了领略这座城市魅力的机会。即 使是大明星或是外国政要来到天津也都会被这座城市的现代化所折敲。至少 从酒店水准看,天津绝对算得上是一级城市。

多样化的建筑

正如首面提到的,关津的天际线正变得越来越美。有时候,我愿不得寒冷的天气,一定要在阳台站一会儿,因为从这里看过去,混处都是天津暴具标志性的高楼大厦。城市的日新月异是一件非喜多半的事。一方面,我们看到了城市的发展进步,而另一方面新楼的崛起意味着日楼要被拆除。一些有历史的建筑和传统的朝同正在逐渐消失。有一次我的英国朋友来天津看我,我带她到小自楼的歌式风情伤。当然我不是为了让她看那些歌式建筑,而是这背后的几条未被拆除的老巷子。现在仍有居民住在这些老楼里,保留着旧的生活习惯。我朋友对此颇为惊叹,眼界大开!我希望,天津在快速发展的同时能够保留这座城市最短的一直,这恰恰是人们爱上这座城市的原因,不是吗?

更加便利的出行

如果你是个忘门必打车的人,你是体会不到这些差别的。我刚来天津的 时候,天津只有一条地铁线路,而现在同时有4条线路在运营,其中9号线还 能便捷地通往塘沽。地铁5、6号线和2、3号延长线也正在建设中。我最崇待 的就是直通机场的2号延长线,这样我就不会被无良的出租车司机坑骗了。但 是我想,是不是以后能有条铁路线直接从天津到北京机场,因为天津机场的 国际航线还比较有限,我们只能从北京出发。

民以食为3

天津是否能被称为一线城市,其中一个标准还在于其餐饮业的发展。我 们的摸稿人帕克在两年前来到天津的时候,想找一家口味稍像纯正一点的酒 餐厅非常的难。好餐厅不是没有,但价格自然不菲。但是最近两年,西式的 餐厅和咖啡厅像两后春笋一般开造了天津市的大街小巷。仅以奥城为例,几 乎每家餐厅都会有味道不错的三明治满足外国人每天的用餐需求。进口食品 超市也越来越多,服务也很周到,能让我们享受一处式购物的便捷。

环境问题喜忧参半

说起环境,人们首先想到的就是这雾霾天。如果你问本地人这个问题, 他们会说,故鞭炮确实不好,但那是人家的自由。不论是婚夜嫁要还是驱鬼 请神都能成为放炮的理由。说到好的一面,那就是天津的绿化。每年冬天, 道路两旁的大树都被穿上厚厚的冬衣,为了让他们抵抗寒冷的天气。新建成 重修开放的公园也越来越多。不论是水上、南翠屏这样的大公园,还是你家 门口的社区公园,风景都是一样的漂亮。这些公园种了很多月季花,听说这 是天津的市花。

热情的哏儿都人

天津人是这座城市最可贵的财富。他们深爱着自己的城市,以这座城市 为菜。天津人都十分态家,不愿意到其他地方生活。一方面这让天津的本地 风味完好保留,另一方面却会影响城市的活力,会形成大城市里的小城窟 识。一些不文明行为仍然存在,但越来越多的人已经有了自觉抵制的意识。 进步虽然是缓慢的,但从未停止。

生活在天津人中问让我的生活变得更加多彩!从他们的眼里,我看到真 实的天津。天津一直在努力地提升自己并且已经取得了很大的成就,正在向 着一流大都市的目标迈走。无论如何,我都要感谢这座城市,我们爱你!

ianjin is my beloved city. Perhaps if you have just come here you, you don't understand my feelings, maybe you feel that Tianjin far behind your own country in many ways. We all experience these feelings at first, and the culture shock just adds to what sometimes turns into disappointment that the city we have chosen to live in is far from what we expected. Has Tianjin failed to live up to your expectations? Do you wonder what you have let yourself in for? Although you heard about the pollution problem before you came, you probably never realised that the sky could be this grey. Do you have friends in other parts of China, like Shanghai or Beijing who wonder why you have come to Tianjin? Perhaps they tell you to guit this city and go somewhere "better". When I first came I knew someone who was living in Beijing and he was leading a really nice, comfortable life. He said to me "You should come here, you can buy lots of English food". This is actually a big deal because 'although we now have guite a few high quality import shops here, they mostly sell American brands. However by that time I had already become attached to Tianlin and so my reply was "I can buy English food in England". If you can get over the first few months here, if you can get over the physical sickness, the home sickness, the culture shock and the "Oh my goodness what have I done!" feelings, you will learn to love Tianjin

If you talk to any of us that have been here for some time, you will find that even though we are foreigners, we don't really like people criticising Tianjin, because it actually is a very special place. We have seen many developments, and you will soon realise that Tianjin is evolving all the time and that it is a powerhouse of a city. You have come at the right time because soon Tianjin will be a much sought after place to live in and prices will rise. Let us remind ourselves of some of the facilities we can enjoy here.

The Schools

Those of you that came here with children naturally worried about their education. However you have since discovered that the schools here can compete with anywhere in the world. They have the most amazing facilities and the syllabuses leave me green with envy, they make me wish I could go to school again. If you talk to your children, not many of them will say that they hate their school, and one reason is that there is definitely a lack of bullying. In our own countries bullying in schools is rife and recently there have been several reports of teenagers being bullied to death, including some committing suicide because of being harassed through networking sites - that does not happen here and not just



because these sites are not available! Apart from the fact that there is zero tolerance to bullying here, the children, as they are all far away from home, band together and there is a spirit of real carnaraderie. No doubt the many artistic performances that the kids give promote teamwork. Every year the schools give concerts that are huge productions, I have been to several and can totally recommend them, and you don't need to have children at the school to watch them. Seeing how much effort the schools put into these activities shows the commitment invested by all parties, the teachers, the students and the parents.

Recently there have been one or two new schools added to the fine portfolio and most of the other schools have all made big improvements to their existing facilities. The schools definitely add to the advancement and gentrification of Tianjin, no longer a poor old lumbering behemoth, crouching at the table of Beijing waiting for a few crumbs to drop.

Each international school has its own special characteristic to recommend it. Western schools tend to emphasise sport and team work, and also they encourage lateral thinking and problem solving. A large percentage of the pupils in most of the schools are Korean, and it may be that at first Korean parents do not understand the schools' ethos. However once they see that their children are happy and fulfilled, and therefore keen to go to school and learn, they relax. Tianjin can really rival anywhere as far as international education is involved.

It is not just the children of expats that can get a good education. Tlanjin also has many fine universities that Chinese students attend. Shi Fan University is farnous for producing teachers. Nankai University is farnous all over China, as it has produced some of the country's highest ranking government ministers. The Foreign Languages University is living history. It really is worth taking a little trip just to look at the buildings and read the plaques explaining their background. Apart from these three there are actually many universities here, a fact that is attested to by the existence of University City (大学城). As far as education is concerned, Tianjin is not a second class city.

The Hotels

Well what can I say? At first I was worried about the amount of new five star hotels that are planned for Tianlin, as we already have a good amount of particularly fine hotels here. However many businessmen tell me that it is a good thing for the city as good hotels are a measure of its development. As I am not a businessman, I can't come to terms with this thinking. My view is that if there are so many businesses in the same field all vying for custom, there are a finite number of customers and the supply and demand criteria is not being met, i.e. supply outstrips demand. However one thing is definitely true, as there are so many newly opened hotels this year, the other hotels are facing stiff competition and that is good news for the customer. They are all so keen to attract custom that they have really good deals on offer. The hotel buildings themselves absolutely enhance the city and are definitely one reason why our skyline here is becoming more and more attractive.



I have a friend who has a Chinese wife. They wanted to come and see me, but at that time it was not convenient for them to stay at my house so I offered to book them into a hotel. The wife was not that keen at all, because as far as she was concerned, Tianjin is not as developed as where she is from, and she also thought that there was nothing much to see here and nothing much to do. I was keen to show them Tianjin and had it all planned out as to where I would take them. In the end they didn't come and it is such a shame as they have no idea what they have missed. Maybe they thought I was going to book them into a cheap hostel. Of course we have those here too, but we can rival any other city for fine hotels and the beauty of a five star hotel in Tian(in is, that whilst the price is cheaper, the facilities and service are of the same high standard as anywhere else. I would really be proud to introduce any of my friends to the hotels here. When famous people come, or high ranking government officials, they will be pleasantly surprised by their temporary home. As far as hotels are concerned, Tianjin is a first class city.

THE BUILDINGS

Two or three of the fine hotels also enjoy the double distinction of the hotel building itself being a tourist draw. We have many original buildings here, not only in the Five Streets area, and they also have their original fixtures and fittings. It is heartening to see that they are being preserved and maintained. I have a wonderful view of the skyline from my bedroom balcony and sometimes I just go outside, no matter how cold it is and marvel at the lights across the city. Like many of you, I have seen buildings spring up in no time, and if you don't visit a particular area for a month or two, by the time you go back it will already have changed. In a way I both celebrate and lament Tianjin's rapid development, because there is no doubt that some of the old ways and hutongs are being

swept away. When my friends from England came to see me, I took them over to Xiao Bail Lou, the European Street. They were absolutely not interested in this, and thought it was boring that there were so many recognisable Western restaurants. Actually my reason for taking them there was not to see this street, but the ones behind. There are several little alleys with absolutely ancient buildings that people still live in. My friends were fascinated, as I knew they would be. I really hope that despite the rapid development, Tianjin is also able to preserve its unique character. If you had to give a reason for why you love Tianjin, it probably wouldn't be because of the modern buildings,

One thing I have always admired is the way they light the buildings here. Sometimes I get on a bus just for the sake of it and ride around the city looking at the beautifully lit buildings. In Hong Kong, the light show using the buildings down by the harbour is a tourist attraction and many people gather to watch it. I think Tianjin is well placed to offer the same kind of thing in the future. The hotels and buildings over by Hai He are particularly favoured with the best position and I hope someday that they will fully exploit this asset.


Actually I am happy to see that there are different types of buildings cropping up all over the city now. Before I thought that most of the buildings were just grey concrete monstrosities, but I think that attitudes are changing. It is exciting to see the new Xian Nong development and to see how they are restoring and preserving the courtyards. If you have been living here for some time, no doubt you feel the same as I do, that if your friends come to visit you from your country, you will not be embarrassed to show them

around, in fact you will be proud to do so. As far as buildings are concerned, as well as the history, Tlanjin is becoming a first class city.

It is already much better than when I first came. Of course for those of you that take cabs everywhere you won't realise this! All over the city you can see the new subway lines being built. It seems that for a long time there was just one line and now all we have four, including line 9 which goes out to Tanggu, and they are also building lines 5 and 6. The one I am most excited about is the line going straight to the airport. This city desperately needs it. I am tired of the majority of taxi drivers at the airport, they are only willing to take you long distances. This I can understand as they have to wait in line for a long time, but when you agree to let them take you home, many of them will go on a detour. The airport line will resolve this

No doubt you are all really pleased with the high speed train to Beijing, how convenient has that made our lives? Having said that, at the moment going to Beijing Airport is a bit of a trek. It means either taking the 21/2 hour bus from Tianjin or taking the fast train to Beijing, braving the subway system there, which involves changing lines two or three times and then taking the airport express. In rush hour this is a nightmare journey. My ideal situation would be a train from Tianjin directly to Beijing Airport. I think in view of Tianjin's increasing importance, this is something that needs to be taken care of. At the moment Tianjin Airport does not serve many long distance routes and I cannot fly to England from there.

The traffic is an ongoing problem, which I am convinced I could resolve. I have noticed that the traffic lights are all being upgraded and now they tell us how much time we have, either to cross the road, or to drive on. This has definitely added years to my life, as before crossing the road meant saying a silent prayer before attempting it. My friends used to tell me, 'Just cross, don't look at the cars, they will have to stop for you". Unfortunately, many times I have seen when the cars did not stop when somebody just stepped out into the road. The new traffic lights are a positive step in the right direction. Also, every so often the police have campaigns where they stop the cars and check the drivers' credentials. I even know where the traffic police station is to pay fines, so some laws are already in place, and gradually others will be introduced. At the moment, although I cannot upgrade Tianjin to first class status as far as transport is concerned, I would say that the transport system is a work in progress.

THE RESTAURANTS

Tianjin now has some fantastic world class restaurants and I really can say it is a first class city as far as eating is concerned. What do you think? What are your favourite restaurants? I must say that apart from the fine cuisine offered by many restaurants and hotels now, I am also a fan of Chinese traditional food, and one of my greatest pleasures is eating shao kao (street barbecues) with my good friends. Parker has his own take on the restaurants based on his experiences and this is what he has to say:-

Things in China move fast. And the proliferation of quality spots that offer up decent Western cuisine in Tianjin is no exception to this rule. When I first arrived in Tianjin over two years ago the Western food scene was a sad one at best. I learned to love

Chinese food out of sheer necessity, and luckily I did because my current job requires much of the famed Chinese baijiu business dinner. But I digress.

Western food a few years ago in Tianjin was either expensive and of good quality, which meant it was out of reach for many on a day to day basis, or on the other extreme you could grab a hanbao (hamburger) on the cheap at one of the few Western style restaurants, if you were on a budget and willing to brave food poisoning, this was THE option for many of us.

Since then the cafés and restaurants that offer good Western food (and coffee) at reasonable prices has grown considerably. One can get lost among the Western style coffee shops in AoCheng that all have at least a satisfactory sandwich on the menu. Hexiand Nankai districts have their share of not-so-hidden gems like Ganggang, a great spot that combines an import grocery with an excellent eatery on the second floor that makes for a great one-stop-shop. If you like Eastern, non-Chinese food there a few Indian restaurants that have excellent food that my Indian and Pakistani friends frequent, like Golden Fork which is across from Tianjin Medical University.

It used to be the case that the number of restaurants offering a good burger or pizza could fit on one hand. That has changed in





the recent past. While we may still be within a two-hand count, the progress is much appreciated by this laowal. It no longer feels like a Western food desert. Of course the more you are willing to spend, the greater your number of choices but the expansion of restaurants that are still within reach of the significant student population of the city is exciting.

Of course sprinkled throughout the many fusion or mainly Chinese restaurants, one can always grab an Italian Noodle dish (意 大利面) but I would steer clear of these if you want something more authentic. These dishes are "Italian" in name only. However, if you or a dining companion just can't stomach the local flavor it's a safety dish.

While Tianjin still lags behind Beijing in affordable foreign options, we are still enjoying a food scene miles ahead of what it used to be and most of the old favorites are still around. As more Irish Pubs, Texas BBQ's, and authentic Italian restaurants grow, Tianjin starts to feel more comfortable. It will never feel exactly like home, but that's ok. To expect the same food scene on the other side of the world in a developing country is probably asking too much anyway. For now I am happy to sit back and watch the development of our own corner of China and how Tianjin will continue to satiate the occasional craving for a taste of home from the expat community.

THE ENVIRONMENT

Unfortunately it doesn't seem likely that at any time soon the pollution problems will be resolved. What I don't understand is the attitude to fireworks. In Beijing and Hong Kong there are strict rules about letting fireworks off and private displays are largely banned. In Tianjin however, people view it as their right to set fireworks off. If you speak to your neighbours they will tell you they know it is bad but they will say "but they make the place lively". Deaths, marriages, or scaring off of ghosts are all excuses for a good explosion. If you haven't spent the Spring Festival here yet, boy are you in for a surprise. You will think the sky is alight.

One positive development is the amount of trees and flowers that are planted every year. If you look closely you will see that some trees are wearing 'clothes', that is the bottom of the trunks are bound with some kind of fabric to protect them from the cold. In some places they are actually covered with a tarpaulin. My friend says she knows that spring has definitely come because the trees are not wearing clothes any more. Some trees are taken away and brought back in spring. I don't know if they take the dead ones away and bring back living ones, or whether it is just to protect that particular species from the cold.

The parks are something that I will really want to praise. Whether your favourite is the famous Water Park, or the People's Park, or Nan Cui Ping Park, (for those of you who don't know, this used to be a rubbish heap and it was transformed into small but very beautiful

park), you will have to agree that they are all going from strength to strength. A lot of money has been ploughed into them and this year the flower displays were spectacular. The roses were particularly beautiful. Somebody pointed out to me that it is Tianjin's native flower.

This year I saw an amazing sight, I saw what looked like humming birds in the beds of flowers. I was baffled as they looked exactly like the birds complete with the proboscis, but they were too small. I checked and discovered that they were humming bird moths. Since I have been here I have seen some birds and insects that I have never ever seen before.

I love the fact that all the parks seem to have beautiful pagodas and pavilions. These pavilions are meeting places where people commonly gather to play music and sing and dance. If you want to hear traditional Chinese music, these pavilions are the places to go to. So although the pollution is something that will be here for some time, a lot is being done to make the quality of life for locals and expats better. Make sure you take full advantage of what is on offer here.

THE PEOPLE

By far the Tianjin's most valuable asset is the people. Tianjiners pride themselves on loving their city, and whereas Chinese people in other cities are quite happy, should the opportunity arise, to go abroad to live, most Tianjiners do not have this wish. In London there is a huge Chinese population, but I have rarely met someone from Tianjin. The fact that they love their home and do not want to leave it has a good and a bad side. The good side is that most people here are locals, (unlike in Beijing where most people have come from other places), which definitely has an impact on the dynamics of the city. That is why we say that Tianjin is a big city with a small town mentality. It is very comfortable to live here, it has most of the conveniences of Belling, but the pace of life is slower and it is a much safer city. This also means that some people can be guite narrow-minded and stubborn in their ideas, as they have never travelled and just believe what their friends tell them. One man told me his family lives in Canada but he can only live there part time with them as he cannot get used to it and spends much of the year here. When I told him "When in Rome..." he replied "I am a Tianjiner, we cannot change" (我是天津人我们改不了)

Actually people's attitudes are changing slowly. When I first heard of the new no smoking laws, I was really sceptical. I really didn't see how this law was going to be enforced. Indeed there are still people that smoke and the restaurants allow them to, despite the fact that they are facing a fine if they get reported. However it is also true to say that many people are becoming quite vocal in their condemnation of those that do break the rules. It is also true to say that some smokers have started to go outside restaurants to smoke.

How about the spitting? Yes many people do spit, but there are more people that do not spit and they are also becoming quite vocal about how it is a disgusting habit. I honestly do not know anyone that spits, I would be quick to tell them if they did, but everyone I know thinks the same as we do. Queue jumping? Yes it is still a problem, but as many of you may have noticed, people are starting to queue in the right place to get on the train in the metro. As stated before, the wheels of change turn slowly, but they are turning.

If you are fortunate enough to have close friends that are Tianjiners, you will find them to be warm and hospitable to the point that it will almost drive you crazy. They are humorous and love to joke. They enjoy the simple pleasures in life like eating and drinking with friends and family. They are generous to the point that they often inconvenience themselves in order to help someone. Loyalty is a highly prized characteristic and Tianjiners have it in abundance. They will stick by their friends no matter what. To quote one of my friends "It does not matter if my friends are right or wrong, I will still support them".

Having Tianjiners as friends is what adds colour to my life here. Through their eyes I have been able to see Tianjin for what it is, a city that is trying hard to improve and is actually succeeding. Tianjin is far from perfect, but let's face it, where we come from is not perfect either. Tianjin is an amazing city and my hope is that it will go from strength to strength. Is Tianjin a first class city? Not yet, but it will be. Thank you Tianjin, we love you.


Whether or not you believe that dancing cured Feng Feng of her disorder, or that it was purely coincidental, Salsa dancing has proven to be beneficial to Feng Feng in ways exceeding those of purely physical health-related

For her, Salsa dancing is a kind of lifestyle, and she hopes people take to Salsa dancing not for physical benefits or the desire to lose weight alone but, more importantly, for an interest in the culture and style of living.

A mother of one, Feng Feng has become a very confident woman. The proud owner of a Salsa dance studio, she has been dancing the Salsa for about 8 years. Dancing is not an alternative to the gym, she states, but a lifestyle choice to benefit one's entire well-being.

In 2006, Feng Feng became interested in Salsa dancing after, ironically, attending a belly-dancing party. Before the party was to begin, some attendees started Salsa dancing, attracting her attention. The dancers looked so passionate and professional, seeming to enjoy themselves very much. Having its origins in Cuba while gaining popularization in The United States, Salsa comes in two primary styles: American and Cuban. They differ in their steps, music, and partner interactions. Right now, the American style is particularly trendy.

The following year, Feng Feng developed chronic hives, an allergic reaction caused by an immunity disorder, resulting in itchy skin that would bother her daily. At the time, she had been taking Chinese herbal medicine, which was proving to be little help. Now, she says she is perfectly fine, however. It seems that after a year of Salsa dancing, she had recovered from



consequence. Dancing has enriched her life in a more meaningful way. She enjoys a healthier, happier mood. She also appreciates the opportunity to network and make lots of new friends. For her, Salsa dancing is a kind of lifestyle, and she hopes people take to Salsa dancing not for physical benefits or the desire to lose weight alone but, more importantly, for an interest in the culture and style of living.

After having studied Salsa dancing for some time now, Feng Feng has been teaching Salsa in Tianjin as of October this year. Her aim for starting to teach Salsa dancing has been to promote the said lifestyle and culture that she draws as a benefit, as well as developing the ensuing social platform, in Beijing, where she has lived for 12 years (and where she studied Salsa dancing primarily), and Shanghai, where she has visited Salsa clubs, people are more open-minded to outside cultures, she says. Conversely, in Tianjin, she has found it particularly difficult to promote the lifestyle of Salsa dancing as the people are more conservative and not as open-minded, she continues.

There are, nonetheless, a few bars and restaurants open to the idea of providing a venue for Salsa dancing, such as the hotel Indigo. These venues see Salsa dancing as a great opportunity to attract people to their establishment, while also helping to promote the new culture and style of living. Through Indigo, Feng Feng has been able to meet other open-minded people like herself, something she has been struggling to find after having left Beijing. She is grateful to the hotel for the social connections, which has even made her more confident, she says. It seems, though, that the dance scene in Tianjin is moving at a slower rate than in Beijing, hence her increased desire to promote this style of dancing.

The hotel Indigo is currently the venue of Feng Feng's weekly free lesson. Into the future, however, this venue may not continue for very long as, as of yet. If it does not, she says that she will find another venue which can continue the promotion of her vision. She will not give up.

The free lesson constitutes a basic introduction to Salsa dancing, providing learners with a few introductory steps to allow them to dance simply to their first song. The basic class is no substitute for attending Feng Feng's course at her dance studio near JinWan Plaza, however. At the studio, teachings focus more on detail and the building of a strong foundation. Currently, her studio classes run every Wednesday from 7:00-9:00pm.

Anyone can take up Salsa dancing, not only women. Feng Feng is annoyed by the stereotype that Salsa dancing is only for women, when, in fact, Salsa dancing requires partners to consist of both a male and female dancer. No matter what your demographics may be, as long as you can walk, you can dance the Salsa. Feng Feng's greatest, continuing headache has been, she says, the attraction of male students.

Currently, Feng Feng is only running a beginner Salsa class as not enough students are of the necessary skill and experience to compose an intermediate class. Once her beginner students develop, she will open an intermediate class to accommodate them. The beginner course consists of 8 classes, at one class per week. There is no need to wait until the current course ends to join, as a student may join at any point in the course. The only stipulation being that he or she must keep up with the others and reinforce their basics in later classes.

Upon sign-up, every student receives a

10% discount for the first six months. If a female brings a male and they both sign up together, the male will receive a 20% discount for the first six months and 10% every month after that. Single classes can be bought, or 10 or 20 classes at a time. Monthly or quarterly membership cards may also be purchased.

Feng Feng has developed into a very confident woman, indeed. Her hope is that people care about themselves, and proposes that Salsa is one of the choices of ways to do so. She has a message to new moms. Mothers should have their own time and life. They should free themselves of the responsibility of taking care of their children. If the mother is unhappy, the child will be able to feel this. It is not only for the benefit of the mother, but for the child, as well, that the mother cares for her own well-being.

She hopes for the growth of Salsa dancing as a lifestyle and that her vision will bring benefit to others. She welcomes you to contact her with your inquires about Salsa dancing and her courses.

人口红利与中国经济发展?

众所周知,变裕的劳动力是中国经济30年来保持高速增长的重要支撑条件之一。虽然目前人口红利还在持续,但人口统计学专家称中国人口红利将在几年后结束。中国不得不面对即将到来的"未富失老"局面,全面放开"二岭"政策也许会是繁决办法之一。

这是由于人口变动会对经济发展速度产生重要影响,人口丰富自然就会而现人口红利,这将有利于经济快速 发展。人口减少则会出现劳动力短缺。这将不利于经济快速发展。

近年来中国生育率长期保持在1.4%-1.5%的水平,远低于其他发展中国家。中国劳动年龄人口也在绝对减少。当劳动力出现短缺之后,中国经济的潜在增长率等降低。超过6%的高增长时代等不复存在。

此外,按照联合国的标准;60岁以上老年人口在人口中的比例达到10%,或者65岁及以上的老年人口占总 人口的比例达到7%,一个国家或地区就成为老龄化社会。中国早在2000年就已经进入老龄化社会。

随着人口老龄化的加速和劳动年龄人口增长趋势的逆转,中国人口总抚养比在2011年降到谷底(0.38),随后 开始缓慢上升,2020年将升至0.4,2033年升至0.5以上。

如果继续坚持严格的计划生育政策。不"放开二胎",那么按照联合国的预测,本世纪中叶以后中国人口抚养比依然持续上升,2070年将达到0.8的超高水平。即4个劳动力至少需要供养2个老人和1个小孩。老龄化将成为中国未来经济社会可持续发展必须百对的重大问题。

"放开二胎" 蒋使得年轻人口得以迅速增加,这能够使中国的人口老龄化状况得到相当程度的缓解,劳动人口增多,加上科技进步,可以极大地提高生产效率。这样老人能够老有所依,安享晚年,不会发生社保空账甚至 原盘食机。

Baby Booms and Labor Busts How Will the Changing OCP Affect China's Economy?

or the China watcher in us all; the newest analysis of demography and the effects of the maturing crop of One Child Policy Chinese will either mean a boom or boon for the Chinese economy. What might this mean for second tier cities like Tianjin?


The key points of the demography discussion in China are that, according to the US Census Bureau, the Chinese population will ultimately stagnate at 1.4 billion by 2026. Secondly, what this means by extension is that the labor force, China's historic economic advantage, will shrink as the population ages into retirement. The pool of young workers to replace their parents is drying up. More interesting findings of the Census Bureau include the estimate that in 2010 the segment of the population aged 20-24 peaked at The key points of the demography discussion in China are that, according to the US Census Bureau, the Chinese population will ultimately stagnate at 1.4 billion by 2026.

124million. Even if you include the population aged 20-59 (working age) the peak in labor force will come in 2016 at 831 million. This seems like a big number, and it is, but India and Southeast Asia are experiencing population growth which in this situation means cheaper available labor and a population not burdened by a greater proportion of retirees, both sources of heartache for China's economy.

In India, the aged 20-24 segment is not expected to peak until 2024 at 116 million and overall India is expected to be the world's most populous nation by 2025. Thanks to the OCP, China's fertility rate is around 1.6, and India's is 2.7 (fertility rate is the number of children a woman will have in her lifetime and is closely tied to population growth). While the OCP is loosening it may be too little too late. It all depends on the state and composition of the economy at the time of population growth stagnation.

China is not the first country to weather major age demographic shifts, so looking to other economies, and importantly the state of their economies at the time of stagnation may help predict what will happen in the Middle Kingdom as its population ages, and the OCP tries to adjust accordingly.

Germany saw a similar population stagnation in the 1960's to 1970's and even shrank thereafter. According to Mark Adomanis at Forbes.com, Germany's GDP per capita counter intuitively boomed during the same period of population stagnation.



If that was the case China should be rejoicing in the potential of the OCP to eventually boost GDP per capita, and thereby ushering in a higher standard of living never before seen in modern China. But obviously the German economy of 1960 is not parallel to China's economy today. In fact in 1960 in Germany the per capita income was already many times what China's is, and will be, in the near future. Adomanis also points out that Germany's growth "...was not simply the "catch-up" growth that has been China's stock in trade for the past 30 years". Put another way, China and Germany will be at different stages of development when their respective periods of population growth stagnation hit.

It may be more helpful to compare an Asian neighbor with more economic and demographic parallels to accurately read the tea leaves on China's future. Not that China would necessarily like to be compared with Japan, but there are parallels between China today and the boom in Japan from 1950 to 1970 and the subsequent decades long decline in Japan that China wants to avoid.

Brian Reading and Diana Choyleva of Lombard Street Research point out in a recent report that private savings rates are/were high in both countries leading to banks being able to loan out a large amounts of capital to the industrial sector. This is partially due to a tightly controlled financial sector and in China's case a serious lack of alternative places to stash cash (besides real estate which creates its own problems). In both countries, economic growth relies on export demand. which is propped up by an undervalued currency, the yen and yuan respectively. Add to this the crony capitalism of China and the cross-shareholding in Japan that makes for deep rooted special interest in maintain the economic status quo and you may have a better indicator of China's fate than what Germany offers. One last and very important point from Reading and Choyleva,

... Japan's business and government sector invested to excess in its boom, resulting in a misallocation of resources which, ultimately, turned into a significant drag on growth as banks were encumbered by bad loans. ...China's gross capital investment levels in recent decades have actually been

even higher. While Japan invested up to 36 per cent of its GDP in its fast growth phase, China has lately been investing close to 50 per cent.

Is all that investment really sustainable? If the investment is coming from debt, what might the results be? Some Chinese cities are already seeing city government debt far outpacing revenues and there has even been talk of the national government having to set up a fund to bail out municipal governments that have overspent on superfluous projects, many times in the name of city branding over meaningful infrastructure, I'm looking at you Tianjin Cultural Center.

So is China doomed to the slowing growth of Japan due to structural and demographic crisis? Not necessarily. If the government can deliver on the promises of reform in the financial and other sectors, and address the problem of an economy that relies on exports and cheap labor that will all too soon not be cheap, China can avoid

economic stagnation in the face of population stagnation. Second tier cities, like Tianjin could be more negatively affected by shrinking labor pools.

Tianjin already suffers from a brain drain. The city is known nationwide for its excellent secondary and post-secondary education but despite this, the talent leaves after graduation in search of opportunities in other cities, or countries. This problem would likely become exacerbated when the labor pool shrinks and the brain drain quickens pace.

I believe it is fair to say that while often creating hardship and interference at the household level, the OCP will soon have even greater impact on the macro-economy. But the policy is seeing reforms, slowly but surely; those born under the OCP regime are now allowed to have a second child four years after their first child if their spouse was also born after the implementation of the policy. Even in a perfectly nimble and impartial system, meeting the challenges of the labor pool bust brought on by the OCP would be exceedingly difficult, though not impossible. However, we live in China and like any country its particular idiosyncrasies and conservatism may complicate reform in regards to these challenges. However, with the right management the economy could become more dynamic, more consumer friendly, and less difficult for foreign firms to do business and partner with China to avoid the looming OCP labor bubble. The next thirty years of reform and progress may not be as bright as the last thirty, but they need not be the doom and gloom that some analysts see. It all depends on you level of optimism, and as I am learning this seems to be inversely related to one's length of time in China. Here's hoping the new reforms of the OCP meet China's demographic challenges today, and tomorrow.

我告诉他应该把这指包菜或价处理,尽量减少损失。但他无法接受这个提议,因为他要为自己的错误买单。我 让他仔细考虑考虑这个问题,因为这涉及则以后是否还能继续合作。几天之后,他联系到我的销售部,给了我们一 个新的报价。这个新报价把更换包装的成本都转嫁到产品价格上了。

为解决这个问题,我们必须重新研究一下合同条款。合同中明确规定,该供应高项用的包装必须能够保证产品 在运输和移动过程中完好无损。现在这个结果,供应高必须负全部责任。但对方所依据的条款是,我方提出任何额 外要求或更改订单所造成的成本须由我方承担。显然,他认为我让他更换包装是一个额外要求。

双方各执一词的情况下,我们必须找法律额问来解决。通过咨询双方的工程师,法律顾问最终认定对方需要对 择坏的产品负责,并且不得对产品加价。

避免浪费是没有结的,但是不能以钢性产品质量和客户满意度为代价。如果这个供应商从一开始就选择了正确 的包装就不会有后面的损失以及生产的能误。

W e all know that waste is one of the curses of modern culture. This is especially true in developing nations and because there are no fixed processes for reducing waste compared to the highly developed recycling and waste reduction programs that are now old news in advanced economies.

In developing nations however, the economy still yearns to strict waste management protocols to reduce the negative effects from pollution to food and water scarcity to the exponentially increasing prices of many raw materials that came under strong usage with the turn of the century.

When it comes to manufacturing economy, waste management is an extremely integral and important part of the manufacturing facility and process success. Without waste management and cost cutting techniques from Lean Manufacturing to Six Sigma to Supply Chain Streamlining to Organizational Development, all these practices and methodologies have their unique places in today's manufacturing economy.

One such instance came to my attention recently. It seemed that one of our suppliers providing small gears for high volume use had a frequent issue with the product packaging and we commonly found the small gears broken during shipping. It seemed that the package is not strong enough to hold the several more packages that are placed on top of each other.

We contacted the supplier and requested that the packaging to be changed to a better solution. They seemed to not like the idea of changing the package so soon after shipping has started. However, they promised that the package will be changed ASAP.

ASAP was the key term herel For the next batch arrived with the same weak and sub-par packaging and many gears were broken. I thought this required some tough action so I called them again and told them that I will be resending them the packages back on their own expense because the problem is being repeated after our initial warning.

What happened was frankly a bit funnyl. They apologized because of the problem and they explained that they had intended to change the packaging to a better solution once the current amount of packages is finished. I answered by saying that the gears were arriving broken because of this issue and that it wasn't a suitable solution for even one

He seems to have received a strong shock when I told him that the packages will have to be scrapped and sold at a loss. His mind couldn't accept the fact that he has made a wrong choice and will have to pay for the mistake. At the same time, he kept trying to think about a different use for the current amount of the packages and kept saying "but there must be some use for them ... We must use them for SOMETHING!"

llet him contemplate on his loss and think about what this means in the grand scheme of things and returned to my work only to be surprised later that week that the supplier has been in contact with the purchasing department and that the purchasing team has had a strong argument with their sales team about the packaging issue events.

What happened is that the supplier has contacted the purchasing team with a new price list and required an increase in pricing to reflect the extra cost they will now be paying for better packaging. I was less than happy with such attitude of course because packaging is always treated as part of the product. I should not be asked to pay extra for packaging if the initial packs didn't protect the product well and it always arrived damaged.

We went back to the contract and the problem is that we each relied on two different clauses that seemed to justify our respective positions. My team on one hand relied on the clause that says "Supplier should ensure that packaging is adequate to protect product delivery, shipping and subsequent movement and mobility" which of course meant that receiving broken gears due to a package issue is of course unacceptable and was only the supplier's problem to deal with.

The supplier on the other hand relied on a clause that said "extra requests and changes to initial order will be charged as an extra cost to the buyer" which pointed to the idea that the packaging I am ordering now is an extra feature. However, this lacked the common sense that the initial batch itself arrived damaged. So the initial batch in a sense broke the contract because the Supplier HAD NOT ensured that packaging is adequate to protect product delivery, shipping and subsequent movement and mobility.

There seemed to be a lapse of reason and we had to get the legal teams to hold a meeting to discuss the correct meaning of both clauses and decide how to manage such a nuisance. They held the meeting the following week and for six hours both teams argued that the other side wrongfully understood the contract and the clause.

It seemed like there might be a long term problem arising from this issue and I began to supplier. The supplier's representative made one last effort to convince me to let him use the remaining amount of packaging material before converting to the new type.

After I refused, he tried to sell me the packaging which I thought was a joke because I had absolutely no reason to buy it as I do not use it at all. It just seemed that they really hate it when something goes to waste. But in any-case, we finally agreed to make the change to the new packaging material starting with the new batch and as much as I was feeling for the supplier's loss with the old packaging material. I felt relived that this was finally over.

It just seemed that the urge to avoid waste was too strong with the supplier's team to the extent that they risked the quality of their product, the customer satisfaction of one very important client corporation and the productivity gap that might have resulted because of any stop in production for the sake of recovering some lost profitability that could have been averted in the first place if they had managed to buy and use suitable packaging



get concerned that they supply chain would be severely affected if some problem arises A between us and our supplier. This might have been a strong blow to a slowly improving package.

season and would have been a badly timed set back at the time being.

However, it seemed that good luck finally visited. The legal teams after consulting with engineering teams from both sides made a final decision that it is in-fact the supplier's fault and that the prices had to remain fixed and the packaging would have to be paid for by the materials from the first batch.

As for the supplier's manager, I just visited his plant and to my surprise, I found the old packaging materials still there being used as protective surface for newly painted floors. I jokingly said "so you have eventually found a use for this material". He didn't share my smile when he said with a disturbed look on his face "what a waste! What a waste!".


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



The German Chamber would like to thank all supporters who made this special day happen and wishes everyone a Merry Christmas and a happy New Year 2014!



















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
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THE QUEST FOR INDEPENDENCE (but only if the parents agree)

What is one of the first things you did as soon as you came of age?

// rom now on you are not getting another penny out of mel my father told me after I had got a Saturday job at the age of 14 and three months. That was fine by me, his measly financial contribution to my social life was not helping me to get into the local disco, or go to the cinema with my friends. From the time I received my first pay packet for 8 hours work, I knew I could do anything with financial independence. From that point on my mother could not criticise me for wasting my pocket money, I had none. From that point on I was spending my own hard earned money. When I asked her if I could go on the school trip to France she told me I could - if I paid for it myself. I could, I was a working woman, or at least a working teenager. I could do anything. Of course at that time when she told me that if I needed money I should go and get a Saturday job and stop being a parasite draining them of money, which doesn't grow on trees, (why do parents say this?) at the age of 141 knew exactly what grew on trees and didn't need it explaining to me what didn't grow on them.) She didn't call me a parasite but I could tell by the tone of her voice that that is what she meant. Hence I went off muttering dark threats under my breath along the lines of "You just wait until you are old, even if you beg me for money you won't get a penny out of me", and got a job, 8 hours per week in a clothes shop. It was the making of me.

When I tell my Chinese friends stories of my childhood they really can't understand how I now support my parents' decisions. They did exactly the right thing. I learned that if you need money you have to work for it. Whilst I was using my parents' money I was quite happy to waste it, but once I had to work hard for it, I didn't want to waste it and so it taught me the true value of money – it is ok to waste somebody else's money, but not your own!

As Chinese parents micro manage their children's affairs, every new purchase is minutely examined. Li says that every time she goes home, her grandmother looks into her bag to see what is new. "How much did you pay for this?" she demands each time. Li has now learned to say 10 rmb, even if it was several hundred. If she doesn't she will never hear the end of it. Needless to say her grandmother is under the mistaken impression that Tianjin is a very cheap city where everything costs 10 rmb. If she ever comes here.......

What is one of the first things you did as soon as you came of age? Most youngsters want to get their driving licence as soon as possible. How many of your Chinese friends can drive? My friends tell me that they can't drive because they can't afford to buy a car. However when I got my driving licence, I could not afford to buy a car either, but I wanted at least to be ready for the time when I could. Actually I think my friends have no intention of achieving this piece of independence, their fathers can drive them to where they want to go.

Xiao Hong commented that the recent badly polluted skies must remind me of London. When I reacted in fury, the sky is one of the things I miss most about England, she said "London is the foggy city because of the pollution isn't it?" "How can you stand there

and talk to me about pollution? Tianjin is the foggy city, not London. Anyway, how do you know what the sky is like in London?" Oh everybody knows that, someone told me." I wanted to shout at her "Was it Charles Dickens who told you?" but I didn't know how to say his name in Chinese. "Don't listen to what other people say, come and see for yourself if you don't believe me" I invited her. When I invite my friends to come to England with me, most just dismiss it out of hand and won't even bother finding out what they have to do to come. They think it is much safer to stay here – plus some of their parents would never agree.

One friend who was complaining that her mother was driving her crazy as she kept fixing her up with blind dates, found the love of her life and married him. Now she is a fully fledged blind date supporter and keeps telling our other friends "I thought my mother was wrong but she was absolutely right. From now on I am going to listen to everything she says". Now she has a husband, surely she should be taking his opinion into account. Why am I worried, her husband is not complaining, it is just accepted here.

My friends tell me they are willing to do what their parents say as they have more life experience, they have lived longer and done more things. Is this necessarily true? I don't think so, maybe their parents have been married and brought a child up, but this doesn't mean they have more experience. Some of my friends' parents have hardly ever left their home town. I can definitely say that my parents do not have more experience than I do, except for the getting married and having kids part, that is.

Let's get this straight, most Chinese people are not actually struggling for independence from their families, they actually like the fact that the important and not so important decisions are made for them, thus they don't have to take responsibility for any failure incurred, plus they have the protection of mutually shared interests. I don't encourage my friends to oppose their parents, if I did and they regretted it, the responsibility would be laid squarely at my door. I have a bad reputation amongst my friends' parents, I am a wild foreigner who came here without parental permission, my parents didn't want me to come. I am grown up, they can't tell me what to do" I tell my friends. "What has being grown up got to do with it, you should still listen to them, they know more than you" they say. For the few that do want to take their own steps in their own world, they will face parental resistance. Very few Chinese parents are willing to let their children hold the reins to their own lives. The ones that are fortunate enough to have such understanding parents are to be envied.

Many people have attended a university far from their home, but after they graduate they will come back and still be subject to their parents' authority, even after they get married. The ones that want to break free from parental restraint will only do so.....if their parents agree.

Flower Fair Tour: Tianjin Carnival

花会巡演——天津的"狂欢节"

每到中国的农历春节,除了拜大年、吃大餐之外,还要產店会,现實花会 表演。天津的花会历史悠久,它实际上是由古老的皇会衍生而来。皇会俗称 "娘娘会"或"天后圣会",民间口传源于元明时期,有文字记载的历史从清 康熙四年(1865年)始,后更名为"皇会"流传至今。天津皇会是旧时天津民间 极为隆重的民俗活动,它最初仅为祭祀海袢——天后娘娘在其诞辰吉日(农历 三月二十三日)宗举行的庆县仪式。

后来,这些民俗表演为在过年期间增加喜庆欢乐气氛,纷纷到店会助兴。 进而形成惯例。因这种表演没有祭祀成分,所以被姚称为花会。花会大提游是 天津各路民间艺术绝活的大比排,也堪称"天津的狂欢节",每到正月十五、 十六,在古文化街、杨柳青和墓沽等地,都会把这一活动推向高潮,不仅有几 十道花会轮看表演,还会有极万人上街围现。经过岁月的演化,重会和花会已 由单纯现场风间信仰的主魔,扩展到展示天津民俗风情的全民性盛大节日。



hen it comes Chinese Lunar New Year, in addition to visiting relatives and having big dinners, Chinese people are going to wander around at the Temple Fair, or watch live shows at the Flower Fair. The Flower Fair in Tianjin has a long history because it actually started in the Qing Dynasty (1665), according to the record of Tianjin history, which is also known as "Huang Hui" to this day. However, it is called "Niang Niang Hui" more often amongst Tianjin folks. All in all, Tianjin "Huang Hui" was an extremely solemn and ceremonious folk activity during old times. Initially, this activity was a ceremony of sacrifice to the sea god, Tian Hou Niang Niang, with the lunar date of March 23.

Thereafter, the folk performances were meant to add a more festival-like atmosphere during Chinese New Year. The performers kept coming to the Temple Fair every year so it became a tradition. These performances contain no sacrifice parts so they are referred as Flower Fair, Moreover, the Flower Fair Parade is kind of contest of various folk art skills, and this is also called "Tianjin Carnival". Every year on the 15th and 16th of the first month of the lunar calendar there will be many Flower Fair performances, with thousands in the audience around Ancient Culture Street, Yang Liu Qing and Ge Gu Areas, this will bring the atmosphere to the climax. After years of evolution, the Emperor Fair (Huang Hui) and Flower Fair are promoting the theme of folk beliefs and this has expanded to national festival to display folk customs in the old days.



This puts a different light on the whole aspect and throwing half used rolls away is definitely a waste, hence I now understand Susan's attitude. She is helping the environment by not creating waste. Also the hotel managers have confirmed that the toiletries and other things are part of the room price so not taking them would be a shame. Now I know this I will get rid of some of my guilt and enjoy what the hotels provide, although I still have no plans to take the toilet rolls in the future, so maybe it is me that is creating waste. Once again I have learned that things are not so black and white here and that maybe it is actually Chinese people that are right. Will you take half

used toilet rolls in future? If you do nobody will condemn you, although I suspect most of you will not. I think this thinking is a fundamental difference between us and Chinese people. Why don't I take half used toilet rolls? Because it just seems petty to me. It smacks of being unable to buy basic things for myself. However Chinese quests of course can well afford to buy toilet rolls. but they have no qualms about taking them their attitude of one of practicality, that is all. If it is going to be thrown away, why not take it?


Chinese people in some ways are a lot more practical than we are and emotion does not come into it, that is why other Chinese people are able to agree that there is nothing wrong with taking certain items. I asked other Chinese friends about this, they all think it is me that has the problem, they say "You think too much". Yes I do, but even though I agree that sometimes they are right, I will still not change my habits. Also if I ask them what they think, if someone took, say a remote control from a hotel, they just say "Maybe he needed it, if he didn't need it he wouldn't have taken it". Sometimes their logic has me stumped. I just wish they had the same attitude towards food, because the amount of food that is wasted here is shocking.



If they wish to take a sewing kit or similar item for later use, they are welcome to do so and even if there is only one guest in a room and they wish to take all the toiletries, they are also welcome to do that. There are times when guests take remote controls, towels, clocks etc. that are not for sale, nor free. We don't put a price list on these items but there are times when quests have requested the price for the item as they like it so much that they would like to buy it".

A PIGEON IN THE HAND IS WORTH TWO IN THE FACTORY

arjin's Flying Pigeon bicycle is touted as the most popular bicycle brand in history. After learning of its venerable past, I set out to find one of the original roadster-style, one-speed, 28-inch-rim, all-back, built-like-a-tank bicycles for myself. I asked locals and expats alike where I could find one of these archetypal behemoths, only to be met with blank stares.

"Just go to the Gant store," most foreigners would say.

"You can buy a bicycle at practically any market," most locals would tell me.

No one understood my determination to procure a Flying Pigeon bicycle, and in particular ... yup, you've got it the roadster, old-school-style.

Undeterred, I visited online vendors, shops, malls, the "White Market" and even the far-flung North China Bicycle Shopping Mall in the Hebei District. The latter came closest to my quest, but alas, all the Flying Pigeons on offer were decidedly newer styles. I did find my antique version at one dusty shop, but upon pointing excitedly at it, the shop owner glanced from me to the bicycle and shock his head.

"Not" he said in disgust, and then jabbed an impatient finger at the flabby tires and bent wheel. Clearly, I had absolutely no taste. Why would I be looking at that sorry thing when he



correspondence in apologetic tones. "They say there is a retail shop on Binjiang Dao," she added.

Now, I already knew of this shop. I had inadvertently discovered it while wandering around lost one day. Seeing the blue and white Flying Pigeon sign from the dusty street, I had entered, taken stock, pointed to a few potentials, had the clerk write down the prices for me and then left. The reason why that visit had not ended my quest was because the only female-style frame I could find had smaller wheels than the roadster version, and I really wanted those 28-inch rims. Also, the frame just didn't seem as sturdy as what I had grown to expect, so I was doubtful as to whether this bike was truly of original design. Finally, I had actually hoped to find a used bicycle instead of buying new. Not stolen, but used. I thought it would have more character.

Having exhausted all mainstream resources, I had one unexplored option remaining. I knew it was of questionable ethics, however, because that option was offered by someone who suggested in cryptic tones that I flook under the bridges." Little more was said of the matter than that, but I concluded that "looking under the bridges" most likely involved the acquisition of chattel originally obtained by dubious means. I'd like to say that I dismissed this prospect



immediately, but I can not. Let this serve as a warning to others: When you set your sights on a Flying Pigeon, it will lead you down dark and treacherous paths.

And so, my search for a Flying Pigeon brought me to the bridges of the Hai River one Saturday. I had convinced myself that, should I find said bicycle under one of these structures, it did not necessarily mean that it was a stolen good. It could simply be that the owner wanted to rid themselves of such an antiquity. Or it could be that a student wanted the cash to upgrade to an electric bike. It could be any number of reasons ... right?

That day, I discovered all sorts of things

under the bridges of Tianjin. I discovered flutists, accordion players, opera singers, chess teams and tai chi troupes. I negotiated my first bargain (a mortar and pestle) from the flea market on the top-side of one of these bridges, watched crabs trawled by giant nets and snapped portraits of ruddy-cheeked fish mongers. But I did not find my Flying Pigeon.

At this point, I knew there was only one thing left to do: return to Binjiang Dao.

This time, I brought my husband Sam with me since he wanted a Flying Pigeon, too. Upon arriving, we were greeted by four cheerful men in blue shirts, who did not seem to mind that we had interrupted their game of cards. As with the first time, I pantomimed my desires:

The black, 26-inch-wheel bike with the female frame for me and the black, 28-inch-wheel (lucky guy, that husband of mine) male frame for Sam. I even took one last stab at finding my ideal bike size and motioned between my bike-to-be and Sam's, then to the tires, indicating my hope for 28-inch wheels as well. The man I was pantomiming with smiled at me – eurekal I've finally done itl – and then he made an exploding motion with his hands. Apparently, I had quite successfully mimed the repercussions of over-inflating one's tires.

I sighed in defeat. I nodded okay. And then I began pantomiming anew, indicating our need for bike baskets, a light and maybe even a bicycle lock. It all made perfect sense.

This time, the man just laughed. He held up a finger mid-bicycle-lock-motion, swiveled on his heel and promptly marched out of the shop. I glanced around the room. Sam was on the other side pretending not to know me and the other three workers were affecting sudden absorption in their game of cards, at all costs avoiding eye contact.

I was relieved when, two minutes later, the man returned with a younger man in tow. The younger man explained somewhat nervously that he was a student and that he could help translate. Delighted, Sam and I resumed our requests, and after several back-and-forth's, we succeeded in obtaining bike baskets, bike locks and even (to the constemation of everyone there, because "No one uses bike lights in Tianjin!") two battery-operated, handle-bar mounted lights.

Next came the assembly of our Flying Pigeons (the shop has display models assembled only), which was completed in record time. Sam and I were a bit nervous about the expediency of assembly, but we had no choice but to go along with things at this point. We did a little test run outside the shop, tried to ignore the wobble in the pedals (Sam is a veritable genius with bikes, so I had faith he could tune ours up once home), paid our bill and left. Our friendly shop clerk called out a final translation:

"Come back in a week for a tune up once all the parts have settled!"

We weren't sure what to make of that, but we said, "Hao."

And then we were off, flying the wrong way down honking streets on our new, shirry black-and-chrome Pigeons. People actually stared at our bikes in appreciation; it surprised us, really. Two people asked where we had acquired our bicycles and a police man gave us a thumbs-up at a stop light. Generally speaking, the wobbly pedals and rattling frames and general lack of effective brakes (one has to sort of



run along with one's feet to really stop the thing) seemed a small sacrifice for the genuine enthusiasm of having invested locally. Of course, we also lost two frame bolts along the way and discovered a missing spoke on Sam's back wheel. But we were so happy to finally have our bicycles that we cheerfully wobbled our way home. The next day, we found some replacement bolts, did our best to re-align the brake pads and made some other adjustments.

It has now been over four months since we've purchased our Flying Pigeons from that shop on Binjiang Dao. The "chrome" of our handlebars is now a rusty orange, our pedals have fallen off a few times and our brake pads continue needing adjustment. On some weekends, Sam spends more time fixing our bikes than we do riding them (although we do ride them a lot). To be honest, I do not think our purchases live up to the "built like a tank" reputation that the Flying Pigeon roadster established. I have since borrowed a friend of mine's newer, cruiser-model Flying Pigeon (while my bike was in repair) and the cruiser model was far sturdier, smoother, and of superior quality overall. But as nice as my friend's bike is, I still wouldn't trade it for my wobbly dap-trap. And even though the factory might indeed have the roadster style with 28-inch wheels on a female frame, I'm sticking with the one I've got. Because that Pigeon is my Pigeon, rusty joints and all.

Tientsin Race Club

The brick and wood structure is typical of the British-style architecture of the time with a central courtyard. After renovations, the original style was preserved but modern facilities were added. Now it is the Tian Yi Ying Lun Club, a historic cultural facility that combines both natural and artificial landscapes.

Wht's special about the club?

The club activities were mainly social. It has the largest wooden sprung dance floor in Asia. The banquet hall is over 500 square meters and has a 7m tall ceiling. It is easy to imagine the graceful moves, beautiful music and slightly intoxicated singing of the aristocrats. Well, the British society that existed a hundred years ago is coming back to life in Tianjin.

The club has a heated indoor swimming pool of 747 square meters. The rimless pool is designed with the romantic in mind and the water is always clean as full-flow ozone disinfection is continually applied. You can relax totally on your own in the water or get fit with the help of one of the club's professional coaches.

The original bowling green has been preserved. The century-old bowling room is on the first floor of the club. Now you can experience the original British game of bowls, which was one of the main recreations of the aristocrats in Tianjin society last century.



absolutely love Hong Kong and go there several times a year. Although Brits particularly like it, as it has a very familiar comfortable feeling for us, for obvious reasons, no doubt many of you also like it. As it is only around 31/2 hours away, getting there is also a breeze. Direct flights to Hong Kong are quite expensive, particularly if you choose the larger airlines. However if you are on a budget, there are other options open to you as far as flying is concerned, there are several local airline companies that are not bad at all. The airline company that offers the cheapest flights at the moment is Spring Airlines. This is a Shanghai based company and they go to quite a few destinations. By far the cheapest option is to fly to Shenzhen and take the bus or metro to Hong Kong. This is also a very interesting experience.


Previously I have flown to Shenzhen and taken the long distance bus to Hong Kong, which takes about an hour and a half (including immigration procedures) and costs around 120 yuan. This involves going to the immigration port in Shenzhen, taking all your luggage with you and getting off the bus. Once you have gone through the Mainland and Hong Kong immigration checkpoints, you have to come out and find your bus company, get back on the bus and it will take you to the centre of Hong Kong. As this has been the most popular way, the immigration ports usually have huge queues of people.


Recently I found an even cheaper and more straightforward option. I flew to Shenzhen airport, crossed the bridge outside the airport and got on the metro. The metro costs just 9rmb and takes you directly to the

On the journey back I always book with Spring Airlines, Shenzhen to Tianjin, their lowest price is 300rmb, but it is a very early flight, 6.45. a.m.

Hong Kong immigration port at Luchu. The downside of the metro is that the journey takes around an hour, as there are many stops, so sometimes it is actually slower than the bus. The upside is that you get on at the first stop so you will always get a seat and the stops have wonderfully interesting names like "Window on the World", which is a kind of theme park with miniatures of famous buildings. As Shenzhen is a shoppers' paradise it is also convenient to hop on and off at will, do a bit of shopping and continue your journey later.

On the journey back I always book with Spring Airlines, Shenzhen to Tianjin, their lowest price is 300rmb, but it is a very early flight, 6.45. a.m. The Metro starts operating at 6.00 a.m. from some stations so obviously if you book the early flight you cannot arrive in time. Therefore my method is to book an airport hotel. My preferred one is the Shenzhen Airport Hotel. A deluxe room is





So just recently when I went to Hong Kong, I had it all worked out. However, as I did not keep myself up-to-date with the new information, I nearly had a disaster on my hands. Thankfully I went through this and so can pass the information on so that you do not have the same problems. I have such a self-sacrificing spirit!

I booked my flights through Taobao (an internet site), it is a little troublesome because if you don't have a Chinese credit card, once you have booked the tickets, they give you an hour to get the money to them, which means paying it into their bank account. This can be done through the post office or a bank. If you get used to the procedure, it works and it is safe. Once the money was paid into their account, they sent me a text with the flight details, booking reference and even telling me the airport terminal. Once my flights were booked, I then booked my hotels, for which I paid in advance. Unfortunately when I logged onto Spring Airlines' website afterwards, there was a message reminding people that all flights would be moved to the new Terminal 3 at Shenzhen. I foolishly reasoned that it must be near the old terminals. However when I arrived at Shenzhen, it was clear that Terminal 3 is nowhere near the old airport, which is now closed, and where my hotel still is. I was a little panicky as I did not know exactly where Hong Kong was from there. I asked the staff and they told me I could take a bus to the metro. Again I assumed, (never assume, to

assume makes and ass out of u and mel) that they would be taking us to the metro at the original airport. Not so. I followed everyone else and took the bus. This new terminal is miles from anywhere and we were on the bus for around 20 minutes before we got to the metro. I quickly found out however that it is only one metro stop from the old airport so the journey continues on the same route. I worried about getting to the airport for the return journey in time, as I could not cancel the hotel booking and there didn't seem to be any hotels at the new airport. However the hotel provided a free shuttle at 4.30 a.m. so all was well.

So to recap: - Fly to Shenzhen, take the shuttle bus 418 to the metro, take the metro to Luohu. At Luohu take the Hong Kong metro to wherever you want to go. On the way back do exactly the same, voila! You don't need to have a lot of money to travel this way, but you do need a lot of time. The journey on the Hong Kong metro takes about 45 minutes to get to the centre of town. The good thing is that there are less people at the Luohu immigration port. For further information you can check out Wikipedia, just

type in Shenzhen Airport and it will throw up all the information you need. This new terminal is really beautiful and user friendly and is also full of high end shops

For hotel bookings I use a site called Agoda (www.Agoda.com). It gives comprehensive information on hotels all over the world and they offer really cheap deals. If you often book with them you can accumulate points which then can be redeemed against future stays. If you write a review of your hotel, this will generate further points. Paying for the room in advance offers the biggest discount, but some hotels offer the chance to pay later, although this is a little more expensive.

Korean Air's 'new Economy' seats lead upgrade of economy class



Slightly wider seats would result in greater comfort for passengers on long-haul flights in economy class, according to a recent study by the London Sleep Center of the United Kingdom. The study result has heightened the interest in the airlines' strategies for the configuration of economy seats.

Korean Air configures nine seats in a row in the economy of its B777, which allows more generous width and pitch. The pitch for economy class is 86cm, 5cm wider than that of Air France and Emirates, and 8cm

wider than that of American Airlines. Korean Air's "new Economy" seat has a width of 46cm, 3cm wider than the average economy seat of other airlines.

Do these initiatives of Korean Air really work for the comfort of passengers? The study by the London Sleep Center found that a 46cm seat width is more conducive to restful sleep than a seat 3cm narrower. They are also less disturbed during sleep and tend to experience less muscle cramps in the lower part of the body. A brainwave test proved that a seat width of 46cm improved passenger sleep quality by about 50 percent.

Korean Air has made efforts to upgrade economy seats since 2009, when it unveiled its "new Economy" seats, which are much more comfortable than conventional economy seats. The new Economy adopted the ergonomically designed slim seats that enabled 3cm wider pitch.

The slim back of the new economy couch offers maximum leg room. When the couch is reclined, the cushion slides forward to minimize the effect on the passenger seated behind. The headrest can be adjusted by passengers for their comfort.

The new Economy seats are installed in a total of 78 Korean Air planes serving on international routes.

The airline has also upgraded inflight entertainment in the economy class in order to provide better service. The economy seats in all Korean Air aircraft operating on mid- and long-haul routes offer the AVOD (audio video on demand) system with 26.9cm-wide highresolution LCD monitors, enabling passengers to enjoy the music and other programs of their choice at any time.

Korean Air, Boeing to collaborate on UAV project



Korean Air has teamed up with the global aerospace company Boeing for the development of unmanned helicopters.

The two companies exchanged a memorandum of understanding (MOU) on technical cooperation for remodeling 500MD helicopters into unmanned aircraft at the Aerospace and Defense Exhibition (ADEX) held at Kintex in Ilsan, Gyeonggi Province, on Oct. 30.

Choi June-Chul, Senior Vice President of Korean Air for Aerospace Business, Jeff Kohler, Vice President of International Business Development for Boeing Defense, Space & Security, and other related people attended the signing ceremony.

Through the agreement with Boeing, Korean Air will secure the technology to convert the 500MDs of the Korean Army, including the technology for design, remodeling and test-flights. Korean Air manufactured and supplied the 500MD helicopters to the Korean Army from 1976 to 1988, and also sold 250 units overseas.

Korean Air has led the development and manufacturing of unmanned aircraft, including vertical takeoff and landing UAVs (unmanned aerial vehicles), division-level reconnaissance UAVs, medium-altitude UAVs and UCAVs (unmanned combat air vehicles).

Korean Air said the company has accumulated considerable technology through the production of 500MDs and UAVs. Its partnership with Boeing, which possesses expertise on unmanned helicopters, will help the company secure the technology to convert helicopters into unmanned aerial vehicles for the first time in Korea. The technology will also allow Korean Air to expand business in domestic and overseas markets.

During the ADEX, Korean Air also signed an agreement with Boeing for supply of winglets for Boeing's next generation carrier, the B737-MAX. The company will produce winglets for a total of 1,200 B737-MAX units from 2015 to 2022.

Korean Air has manufactured parts of commercial aircraft since 1986, when it first produced wing parts for the B747. It has manufactured and delivered wings and fuselage structures for the B717, B737, B767, B777, B787 and B747-8 aircraft. More recently, as a joint development partner for the B787 Dreamliners, it is participating in the design/development and production of wing and fuselage structures.

Korean Air has been recognized by Boeing on multiple occasions as a Supplier of the Year.

Flight service to America and China reinforced for the winter season

Korean Air has rescheduled its international flights for the winter season, which started on Oct. 27, reinforcing operation on routes to U.S. and Chinese destinations.

Services to the U.S. have been drastically reinforced. The incheon-LA route is served twice a day by A380s, dubbed the "Flying Luxury Hotel," and the aircraft flying between incheon and Atlanta will also be substituted with A380s. The incheon-Dallas route, served daily since May, will be preserved.

The total number of flight services to Chinese destinations will increase by three, compared with last winter season. The incheon-Xian route will be served seven times a week, two more than last winter. The service between Incheon and Xiamen will be also expanded to five times a week, one more compared with last year. Korean Air opened service between Busan and Nanjing in July, flying three times a week.

Flights to Southeast Asian cities, including such popular winter destinations as Da Nang and Kota Kinabalu, will also be increased. Flights on the Incheon-Da Nang route will be raised from four to seven times a week, and the Incheon-Kota Kinabalu route, from two to four a week. The Incheon-Colombo-Maldives route, which opened service in March, will be served three times a week as before.

Korean Air has also rearranged service to several Japanese cities, expanding service to Nagoya and Kyushu, popular winter destinations. The Incheon-Nagoya route will be served 18 times a week, up from 14 times. Korean Air resumed service on the Jeju-Nagoya route, which had been suspended since last winter, operating three times a week. Weekly flights on the route from Incheon to Niigata, an area with radiation risks, and the Jeju-Narita and Jeju-Osaka routes have been cut by two each.

Teaching English and Learning Chinese in the Middle Kingdom By Jeff Walsh

The West is just beginning to understand China_and so am L

Some foreigners do understand China's rich history and culture. China is a proud and ancient civilization with a 5,000 year history. CCTV is the abbreviation for China Central Television, a vast state-owned network of 22 channels in the People's Republic of China serving her 1.4 billion people. Every so often, a so-called "foreign expert" from the West will be featured on a CCTV English News talk show or news program. One recent foreign expert who had been in China for 30 years was asked to share his secret for success to expatriates who have recently moved to China. The businessman in Shanghai gave a brief but very powerful two-part answer- 1) "Everything is possible in China but nothing is easy and 2) You can't change China. China will change you! I couldn't agree more.

I arrived in China in 2006. I live and teach at a university in the northeastern part of China formerly known as Manchuria. Bordering Russia. and North Korea, the trans-Siberian railway is in nearby Vladivostok, Chicago's sister city Shenyang is two hours south by train.

Culture shock and first impressions last a long time in China. Having just opened to the west just 35 years ago-the speed of progress and change in China is faster than a Shanghai "maglev"- a super bullet train that reaches a top speed of 260 mph. The magley can go from Shanghai city center to the Shanghai airport... In 8 minutes.

My first impression was one of suspended disbelief. Ginseng cigarettes? Green Tea Listerine mouthwash? A mile long line to get in a new Pizza. Hut? People exercising outside while walking backwards?

Nighttime is often unusually silent. After 10 PM most campuses are quieter than a library. College age kids wear fashions that Americans

might consider immature or juvenile- bunny slippers, Sponge Bob t-shirts, Hello Kitty hats, plastic sleeves with polka dots, backpacks shaped like pandas and other zoo animals. No one laughs however when the kid in the library with Mickey Mouse jeans and Winnie the Pooh gym shoes says she is going to Harvard for graduate school. The Chinese have a saying about those try to see Beijing, Shanghai, Hong Kong and the Great Wall in 2 days...its like "viewing flowers on horseback".
